

### Lutherans Inaugurate Radio Hour Tonight on Columbia Network

Beginning October 2, the Lutheran church (Missouri synod) is to be represented on the air by a weekly half hour at 9 p.m. Thursday nights over

the Columbia net work, it was announced today. 34 stations in a coast-to-coast hook-up are to be employed. The nearest station in this area is WBBM, Chicago.

The project is being financed by the Lutheran Laymen's league and the Walther league. The broadcast will be known as the Lutheran Hour.

The first broadcast will feature the Cleveland Bach Chorus, under the direction of F. W. Strieter from WHK, Cleveland. The musical portions of later programs will be presented by the Chicago Bach chorus, Sigfrid Prager of Madison, Wis., director; Edward Rechlin, organist of Immanuel church, New York; and the Concordia Seminary chorus, St. Louis, directed by Dean Walter Wismar of the Church of the Holy Cross.

The initial series of sermons will be delivered by Dr. Walter A. Maier of St. Louis. Dr. Maier is professor of Old Testament Exegesis at Concordia Theological Seminary, St. Louis, and editor of the Walther League Messenger, official youth organ of the Lutheran church.

"The Lutheran church is the first denomination to use a paid nationwide network to spread its message" said the Rev. W. F. Suhr, in commenting on the project, "just as it was one of the first churches to own its own denominational station six years ago, KFUD, St. Louis."
