

Takes Legal Steps to Wrest Control of Zion Parks from Overseer

Attorney John R. Bills last week took a second step in his effort to get the Zion park system out of the control of Wilbur Glen Voliva through asking that an order entered in 1927 by Circuit Judge Edward Shurtleff be vacated.

Bills bases his action on a section of the law that provides all persons involved in cases of this type be notified.

When Voliva filed a cross bill to the injunction of the Independents it set up 100 defendants and pointed out that these were representative for the city. Bills contends that all

should have been served instead of 100.

Voliva was served with the summons through a registered letter that he received when he was getting ready to leave on his vacation trip around the world.

The injunction was brought in 1921 but did not come to trial until 1927. At that time a compromise was reached in which Voliva agreed with the Zion Chamber of Commerce to allow the Independents to use the park the same as members of his church but that he would hold title to the land. He agreed also to stand all the costs of the trial.

The action here is secondary to a bill filed in federal court by Bills and Attorney Charles E. Mason in which they seek to quiet title to the park system.

Lake Forest Firm Sues City of Highwood and Also Winthrop Harbor
