LOSS TO SCOUTING IN DEATH OF M. J. TRAUB

The North Shore Area council has suffered the loss of one of the finest leaders in the organization, Mr. Morton J. Traub, the president of the council. Mr. Traub passed away Wednesday night, September 24, after suffering over two weeks from wounds incurred in an accident.

Mr. Traub, who lived in Highland Park, has been most active in scouting both in the council area and in Highland Park since the council was first organized in 1926. Since January 1930 he has served faithfully as president of the council. He has been tremendously interested in the development of Camp Makajawan and has aided greatly in its growth. Mr. Traub, beside his wife and daughter, leaves a son Eagle Scout Morton Jr. This Eagle scout served Makajawan this summer as a junior officer on the camp staff.

All scouts and scouters of the North Shore Area council will greatly miss Mr. Traub. His fine contribution to scouting in leadership and service will not be forgotten.

WHAT SCOUTS DO IN CAMP

What the North Shore Area scouts did at Camp Makajawan this past summer is partly indicated by the advancement they passed. It is interesting to note the merit badges the scout passed the most were the more difficult ones; ones that took near a whole two weeks of hard work to complete. In this group are such badges as cooking, pioneering, athletics, life saving, canoeing, photography, forestry and camping. Following is a list of the most popular merit badges and the number of each that were passed at camp.

Leathercraft, 36; cooking, 34; pioneering, 33; athletics, 33; swimming, 32; life saving, 29; canoeing, 26; woodcarving, 26; public health, 23; personal health, 22; photography, 21; camping, 17.

Records also show that 62 scouts passed second class, 38 passed first class, 19 received tar, 13 attained life rank, 4 were awarded Eagle rank and two earned Eagle palms. 46 scouts passed the Junior Red Cross life saving, five passed the Senior life saving test and three the Scout life guard.
