COMMENDS COUNTY HOSPITAL SYSTEM

Supervisor Obee in Interview in Chicago Paper, Exonerates Officials

Lake County hospital, for months the butt of accusations of inefficiency and extravagance, was exonerated last week by Supervisor William Obee of Deerfield township, chairman of the county committee appointed to investigate the charges.

Obee, following an investigation at the urging of members of the county medical society, issued a statement to The Herald and Examiner, criticizing the accusers and pronouncing management and expenditures above criticism, according to a story in that paper's Tuesday issue, which follows:

A complete report will be read to the board of supervisors at the next meeting, Obee said.

"The men who started this have never set foot in the county hospital. It has been a campaign of malice and jealousy and a blot on the medical profession. None of the statements presented to the civic societies with such conviction has any foundation in fact. They are mere scandalous rumors founded in rancor.

"On a comparative basis, the Lake County hospital is administered at a cost that compares very favorably with institutions ten times its size. The average cost per hospital day for the past year is \$3.55 against \$3.50 for Cook County hospital."

The County hospital, Obee said, operates for about \$80,000 a year with an average of seventy-seven patients treated daily. This includes contagious, tuberculous, emergency and general patients.

Laud Dr. Lieber

Dr. Charles Lieber, county physician, drew a large share of praise from the investigating committee Obee said.

"The county physician is a practitioner of the highest skill and efficiency. On the evidence of my own constituents in Deerfield township he has carried out the most difficult medical and surgical cases with success."

The present hospital management has been proven the most economical to the county, Obee said.
