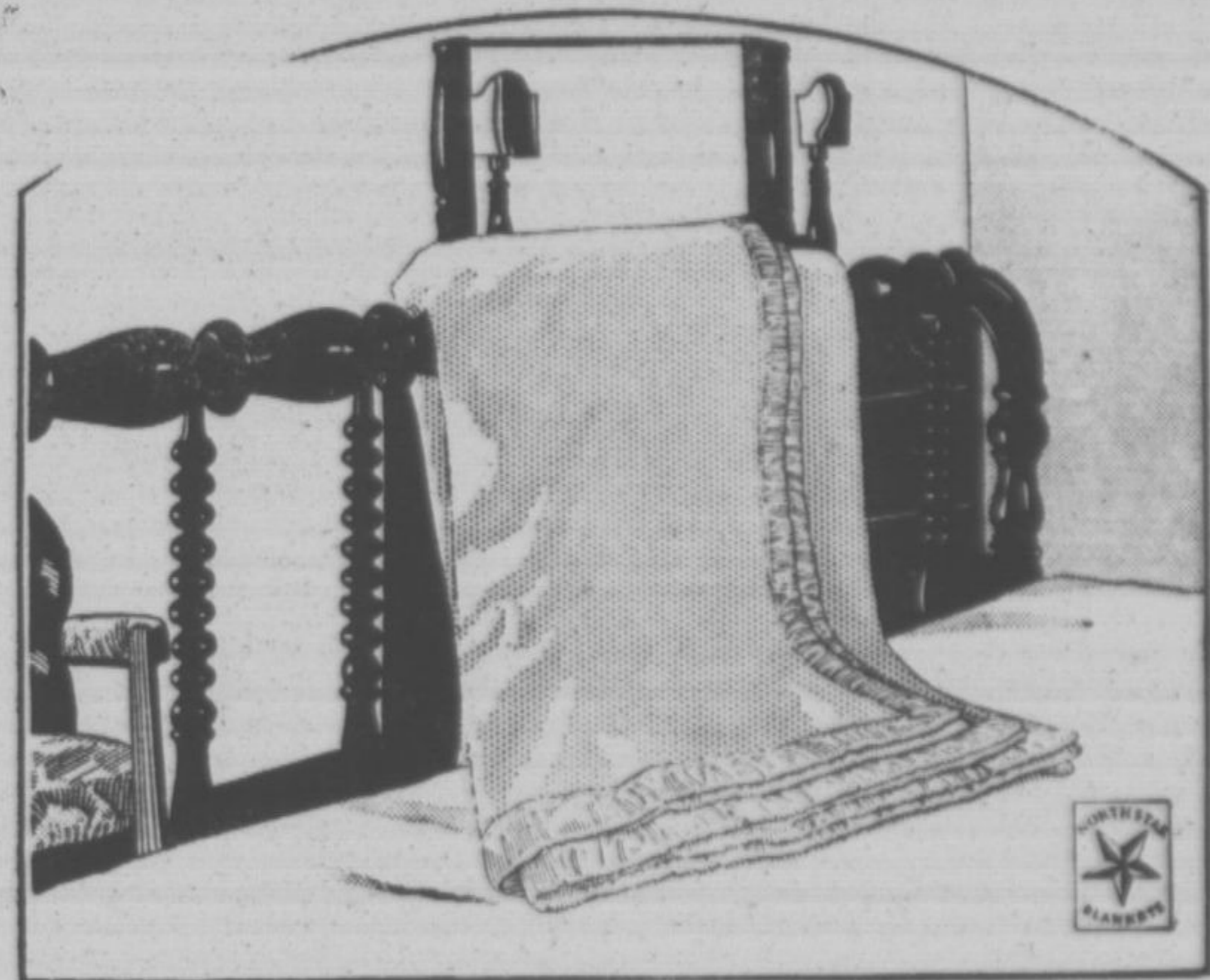
Shares in the association are open for subscription only twice a year, the seventeenth series being open during the current month, and the directors report a large number of inquiries from prospective new members.
