### RYBOLT IS ELECTED GRAND CHIEFTAIN

Mr. Myron C. Rybolt, scout executive of the North Shore Area council, is now the regional grand chieftain of the Order of the Arrow for states of the Central west. This high honor was bestowed upon him by the 150 members at the regional meeting of the Order of the Arrow held at Camp Rienberg, October 4 and 5.

Along with Chief Whirling Thunder of the Camp Makajawan staff, Mr. Rybolt also received the third degree in the order. This is the highest possible rank in the order and denotes outstanding achievement in scouting, leadership and service. Eight other men from Chicago and vicinity were also awarded this distinction.

At the regional meeting the Makajawan lodge of the Order of the Arrow, North Shore Area council was represented by 20 Arrow members, under the leadership of George Bersch, their lodge president. Three of the members were honored with receiving the second degree at the rituals ceremony on Saturday evening. These were Mr. John Huhn of Deerfield, Life Scout Jim Hoffman of Troop 9, Wilmette and Eagle Scout Peter White of Troop 35, Ravinia.

The national grand chieftain over all Arrow lodges in the country, Mr. Robrey Price of Schenectady, New

York was present the whole time to lead and inspire the group most heartedly. Mr. E. U. Goodman, past regional grand chieftain was in charge of the conference. Mr. Goodman is scout executive of the Chicago Boy Scout council and a resident of Wilmette.

The Order of the Arrow is a national camp honor brotherhood made up of the outstanding campers of the many scout camps in the country connected with the order. The members are chosen not by those already members but by those who are not members. The scouts of each troop as they attend camp select their outstanding members to be nominated to honor order. There are 105 Order of the Arrow members in the North Shore Area council.
