State Auditor Gives O. K. to Zion Township

Oscar Nelson, state auditor, last week officially approved of the name of the "Town of Zion" the new township created by the board of supervisors for the part of the City of Zion in the Town of Benton.

The certificate approving of this name was received by County Clerk Lew A. Hendee. The approval of the state on names for townships is necessary to avoid duplications.

Although the county boards approved of the division of the town the change does not become effective until next April when the next set of officers are elected. These officers will serve not only the town but the city as well which will eliminate the expense of one-body of officials.

The Independents, who objected to the change, were especially provoked because the new district absolutely cuts the Town of Benton in half without any land connecting points.

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
