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Coach Saves Student From Drowning in The Pool at High School

Richard O'Connor, graduate student at D.-S. H. S. is in charge of the third team of the freshman-sophomore football squad. He has proved to be a good leader, worthy of the trust the Principal placed in him.

After practice on Thursday, September 25th, the young coach saved the life of one of his team. O'Connor was giving some of his group a swim in the pool, when Richard McNeil, who is unable to swim, entered the natatorium to speak to him. No one in the pool noticed his entry; no one saw him slip on the wet edge to fall into the pool striking his head on the edge as he went down.

One of the boys noticed McNeil in the pool and reported that fellow was seeing how long he could hold his breath under water. O'Connor at once investigated and pulled the victim out. The latter was quite unconscious. However, O'Connor had learned the art of resuscitating a drowned person. Only the day before he had looked at the picture on page 182 of his Biology book, and had read again the Schaefer Method, being especially impressed with the statement that persons had been revived after four hours work.

So he and two others of the team lay the boy on his face, extended his arms, and started artificial respiration by alternately pressing with their hands and releasing the chest at the rear of the lower ribs. In twenty minutes McNeil revived. He says he can only remember a pleasant sensation of taking an ocean voyage. He experienced no bad after effects.
