

H. P. Man Presides at Annual Convention of Illinois Library Assn.

M. F. Gallagher of Highland Park and a prominent Chicago lawyer, is president of the Illinois Library association which holds its annual convention in the LeClair hotel, at Moline, Ill., Oct. 15 to 17, inclusive, and in addition the president, Highland Park is represented at the convention by some of the members of the staff of the Highland Park Public Library.

On Wednesday morning, Oct. 15, the local librarians attended the round table of the trustees' section under the chairmanship of Mrs. Arne Oldberg or that of the children's section, under the leadership of Miss Mary O. Ayres. In the afternoon they attended the meeting of the Reference and Advisory service, with Miss Jane Hubbell, directing interrogatory problems to satisfactory solutions. They also attended the informal dinner at 6:30, at which music interspersed the business program.

In the evening the principal feature of the program was an address by Miss Grace Shellenberger, of Davenport, Iowa, on "The Mississippi River in Literature."

Thursday is Library Service in Illinois day, under the direction of Carl B. Roden, librarian of the Chicago Public Library and is an open conference designed to disclose conditions, reveal needs and devise plans for improving library facilities. There will be frank discussions on township and county libraries and other topics of interest. The annual dinner at 6:30 will close with an address by Everett Dean Martin of the People's Institute of New York City on "What Is an Educated Person?"

Friday morning has been reserved for meetings on lending problems, book reviews and election of officers.

Smallpox Invasion Is Handicap to N. W. Team in Game with Illinois

Northwestern's preparations for the Illinois game has settled down to a period of watchful waiting to find out which of the players will or will not be affected by the vaccination which they underwent Sunday. Every player on the squad was subjected to the treatment, and Coach Dick Hanley is very much up in the air over the men who will be available for the game.

All scrimmage has been called off in the Wildcat camp this week due to the vaccination which was ordered after it was learned that Capt. Hank Bruder, the Purple's ill-starred half-back, was ill with smallpox.

With both the varsity and freshmen players vaccinated, Coach Hanley is devoting the practice sessions to running signals and brushing up on plays.

"We are placed in a perplexing position," Coach Hanley pointed out. "All scrimmage has been forbidden this week while the players are under the effects of the vaccination. We have just got to sit tight and hope that the treatment will have no harmful effect on our regulars. If it does, we will be up against it."

Meanwhile all preparations possible

are being made for the annual clash with Bob Zuppke's Illini. The Wildcats are not permitting themselves to be deceived by the reports that Illinois is a green team and consequently not to be taken seriously.

High respect is held by the Purple board of strategy for such backfield stars as Yanuskus, Berry, Root, Schultz, and Perrine. These ball carriers flashed a lot of power against Butler and will be out to upset the Purple in the big homecoming struggle at Urbana.

In the past three games the two teams have scored thirteen points apiece. The Illini won the 1927 game by a score of 7 to 6 and too, the 1928 game by a 6 to 0 count. Last year Northwestern was the victor in a thrilling 7 to 0 game.

Policeman Injured in Fall of Bleachers at High School Grid Game

One policeman was seriously hurt and several other persons slightly injured Saturday afternoon when the bleachers at the Deerfield-Shields high school in Highland Park, collapsed.

Dennis Driscoll, the injured policeman, realizing that the stands, seating 700 spectators, were weakening, succeeded in getting them cleared before the crash came. He was standing on the top row of seats when the entire tier collapsed, throwing him to the ground and severely bruising his side and right leg. He was able to resume duty Monday. The other injured persons were just leaving their seats when the stand gave way.

The accident occurred at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon, during the third quarter of the Deerfield-Shields-Oak Park football game. Led by the cheer leaders of the Highland Park high school, the students assembled on the

bleachers were swaying from side to side in "yells," when Driscoll noticed that the stands were in danger of collapse.

Rushing to the top tier, he ordered everyone to the ground. Several small children, playing beneath the stands, had just been ordered out when the stands fell. They might have been seriously hurt had not the policeman ordered them away.

H. P. Hospital Among Those Endorsed by College of Surgeons

Five hospitals in Lake county two of them in Waukegan, have been named and endorsed as standardized institutions by the American College of Surgeons, in an approved list presented at the annual meeting held this week in Philadelphia, according to a dispatch to the Waukegan Times.
