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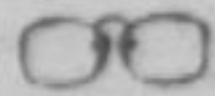
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Deserter from Great Lakes Injured When Attempting to Escape

Last week, in Danville, Ill., Earl Kerns, a deserter from the United States Marine, Corps at Great Lakes, and a former agent of the Department of Justice, narrowly escaped death in a sensational attempt to escape from the custody of Corp. Carter, of Great Lakes, who had arrested him.

While the officer was absent from the hotel room for a short time, Kerns let down the fire escape apparatus and jumped out of the window, expecting to reach the dangling ropes. He missed and fell four stories to the cement sidewalk, turning over once and landing squarely on his feet.

At the hospital later it was reported that he would recover, unless injuries not apparent in the external examination should subsequently develop. When found he wore, strapped about him, the large marine pistol belonging to Corporal Carter. How he obtained it is not known.

Chicago Man Injured in Hunting Accident

Clarence Roessl of 4837 Altgeld avenue, Chicago, began the usual string of hunting season accidents last week, when he accidentally shot himself twice in the foot, while at Griswold Lake with a party of friends. The wounds, which showed infection might necessitate the ampu-

tation of part of Roessl's foot, it was reported.

He was taken to the Elizabeth Condell Memorial hospital, at Libertyville for treatment.

This is the first serious accident of this year's hunting season, though others are inevitable as hunting enthusiasts take to the marshes and woods in search of game.

Two Plead Not Guilty In the County Court

John Sherman of Chicago and Edward Williams, colored, of Waukegan, each pleaded not guilty to charges against them in county court last week before Judge Perry L. Persons. Bail was set at \$2,000 each for trial during the October term.

Sherman is charged with assault with a deadly weapon as the result of an automobile following which Mrs. Ingeborg Gulliksen, wife of the vice president of the Union Bank of Chicago, died.

Williams is alleged to have attacked Otto Hauser with a knife on August 9 in a race riot at Genesee and South State streets that followed a traffic tieup.

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
