the half with the score still 0 to 0. Early in the third quarter "Irv" Garling, 135 pound Deerfield back, was injured and was replaced by Carlson. After an exchange of punts Deerfield was in possession of the ball on their own 20-yard line. Worthington made two yards through tackle and Bartlett and Carlson were stopped with no gain. Worthington stepped back to kick on fourth down. Maiman, who played a whale of a game defensively, centered a bad pass which rolled between the "Sheik's" legs and back to the 10-yard line where Holmquist, Oak Park end, recovered for the Villagers. Two plunges by Graham netted four yards and then Ovson crashed over to give Oak Park a 6 to 0 lead. An attempted pass for the extra point was incomplete.

Deerfield Ties Score

Oak Park kicked off to Deerfield who received on their own 30-yard line and after failing to gain on two plays punted to the Oak Park 30-yard line as the quarter ended. Oak Park was unable to gain through the scrapping Blue and White line and kicked to Jones on the 40 yard line. Two line plays failed to gain and then Bartlett was given the ball. The Deerfield ace fought his way down to the Oak Park 30-yard line where he was downed by Lovett, Oak Park safety man. A beautiful pass to Segert was complete and the ball rested but 10 yards from the goal. Here

Worthington, Deerfield's hard hitting fullback, was replaced by Daugherty. Daugherty gained two yards through center on two plays and then with the Villagers expecting another plunge Bartlett ran around end for the Deerfield counter with the Deerfield stands a shrieking mass. Bartlett stepped back and missed the try for extra point.

Strenger Intercepts Pass

With the score deadlocked at 6 to 6 Bartlett kicked off over Rubine's head and the ball was down on the Oak Park 10-yard line. On the first play a long pass was intercepted by Strenger. Time out was taken for Deerfield when Bartlett was out. Lowe, who replaced Daugherty made 10 yards through the line to put the ball on Oak Park's 15-yard line. Lowe lost five and it was third and 10 when a pass Lowe to Segert was good for five yards. Bartlett crashed through to the Oak Park 5-yard line and the game ended as Bartlett was downed on the Oak Park 2-yard line on the next play.

Fear Railroads May Balk Tax Collection; Ask Carlstrom's Aid

Fear that the railroads will be able to balk the collection of taxes throughout the entire state has led county officials to demand immediate action from Attorney General Oscar Carlstrom, according to County Clerk Lew A. Hendee, president of the state association of county officials.

At present two railroads have an injunction in federal court preventing the collection of taxes and if the roads are successful in this test case the officials fear that all other railroads in the state will follow suit and ask injunctions against the county treasurers.

The attorney general has not defended the position of the state as yet and the association has urged him to appoint one of his attorneys contest the injunction. In the event he does not act a demand will be made for a public prosecutor, the county clerk was informed.

Carlstrom has not become interested in the suit, it is understood because he believes that it is up to each county to make an individual contest. The railroads entered their protest

because they held that the tax assessments were unequal with reasonable rates being given property adjoining railroad rights-of-way and high rates on company property.

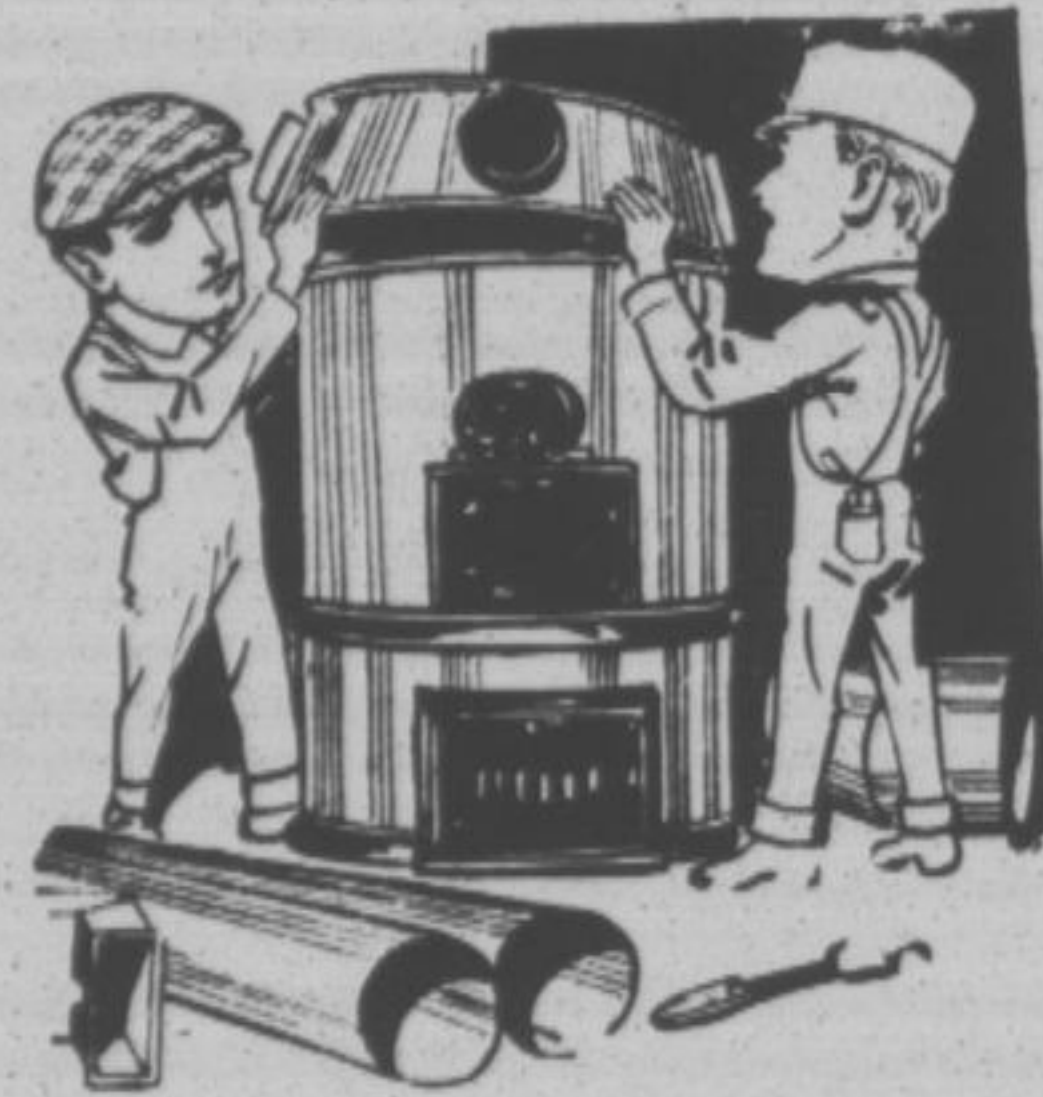
County Clerk Planning For 124,200 Ballots at November Election

County Clerk Lew A. Hendee is planning for the printing of 124,200 ballots for the November 4 election.

While this is not as large as the number issued for the presidential campaign in 1928 it is the second highest order to be needed in the county. The law calls for a 50 per cent increase over the number of votes cast at a corresponding election.

There will be 62,100 with the straight ticket of candidates. On the end of this will be appended the proposed amendment to the constitution which would allow the general assembly to place into effect an income tax.

Another short ballot containing minor issues with three on the prohibition question, two on women jurors and one on the conservation of land for game, will be printed. There will be 62,100 of these.
