

NIGHT POLICEMAN FIRES AT BANDITS

Officer Peter Loesch Again Demonstrates His Efficiency in Emergency

Peter Loesch, special night police officer in the business district of Highland Park, again demonstrated his efficiency early last Friday morning, when he surprised two burglars attempting to break into the rear of the Northwestern cafe on South St. Johns avenue.

The men were drilling holes in the rear door of the cafe and fled at the approach of the officer. The latter ordered them to stop and when they continued their flight he fired twice. He believes that one of the bullets took effect as he saw one of the bandits whirl suddenly and run down an lley. Careful search by the police through the entire city, however, failed to discover a trace of the pair, who are believed to have escaped in an automobile.

Killed Bandit in 1929

On January 13, 1929, Loesch prevented a burglary of Fell's clothing store close to the scene of Friday morning's shooting by killing one burglar and causing his two companins to flee. Both were later captured.

Was Wounded Before
