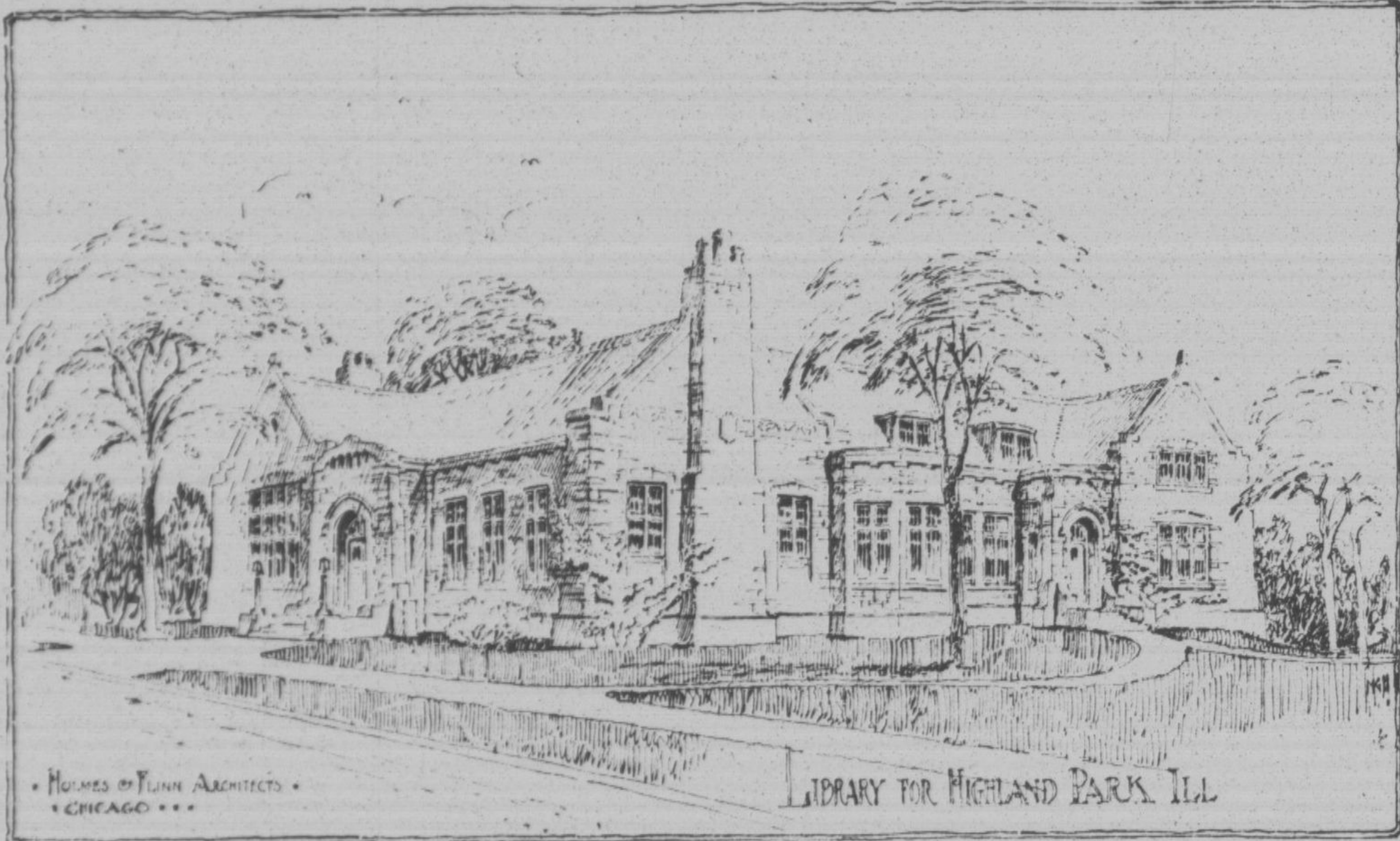


Lay Corner Stone Friday Morning



New Highland Park Public Library building now in course of erection on Laurel avenue, near the new city hall. The corner stone of the library building will be laid with fitting ceremonies Friday morning of this week, at 11 o'clock, announcement of which is made elsewhere in this issue of the Press.

Hundreds of spectators next Friday morning as these thousand of students from the high school and the upper grades of the city's grammar schools march eight abreast down St. Johns, down Linden, and up St. Johns from their respective schools as they gather at the new library site, 380 Laurel avenue, to mark another step in the progress of education, another expansion of one of the most important helps for them in their long journey up the heights of endeavor. These marching hosts with their promise of future achievement are sure to be an inspiring factor in this library corner-stone laying.

Program Features

Dr. P. C. Wolcott of Jacksonville, Florida, for over thirty years a member of the library board, and many years its president, is now in the city and has been invited to open the ceremony with an invocation. Three two-minute speeches will be followed by the placing of the corner stone by Mr. J. B. Garnett, chairman of the building committee. A new copper box will be put in place in the corner stone beside a similar one taken unopened from the corner stone of the old building. The new receptacle will contain copies of the Highland Park Press and Highland Park News, a school paper from each of the city schools, year books of the Highland Park Woman's club, Ravinia Woman's club, the Ossoli club and the D. A. R. of Highland Park. The men's organizations including the Chamber of Commerce, Rotary and Lions clubs

are also to be represented, together with pictures and reports from all institutions of the city.

To Close Streets

Laurel avenue will be closed at ten o'clock to automobiles, and the Boy Scouts will help with the arrangements for handling the crowd. The Library will be closed from 11 to 12 a. m.

Holmes & Flinn are the architects of the new building which is built in modified Gothic style of Wisconsin limestone with a trim of Indiana limestone. They were first engaged in 1914 when it was thought expedient to enlarge the old building. The World war stopped further operations at that time, but several sketches were made previous to 1927 when a consultation with prominent Chicago architects showed the impracticability of remodelling the old building to fit such a rapidly growing community. The E. L. Archibald Co. are the general contractors.

To Cost \$130,000

The present structure shows the result of months of careful planning with the aid of experts in library architecture. The cost of \$130,000 is to be paid by a city tax which has been accumulated since 1927.

Highland Park is to be congratulated upon its board members who have given unstinted time and effort to this civic center throughout all the years. The present board consists of: Mrs. F. D. Everett, president, Mr. J. B. Garnett, vice president; Rev. Frank Pitt, secretary; Mrs. C. W. Balke, Mrs. O. L. Beardsley, Mr. E. H. Eitel, Mr. B. C. Howes, Mrs. Charles Rubens, Mr. Jesse L. Smith.

The members of the building committee are: J. B. Garnett, chairman; Mrs. Charles Rubens and E. H. Eitel. Miss Clara Hendee is librarian in

charge of the Highland Park Public Library; she is assisted by a competent staff.
