nue, which, according to the Press article, originated with me. The plan referred to is probably the one which I mentioned to the directors of the Chamber of Commerce but, if you will remember, I spoke of it as the plan that Mayor Lewis had suggested at a meeting with the property owners on Central avenue, west of Linden, last summer.

The mayor's suggestion was that the property owners west of Mrs. Sampson's properties at the northwest corner and at the southwest correr of Linden and Central avenues should agree to assume a special assessment tax for the purpose of purchasing and improving the Sampson property for park purposes. In such an event, according to the mayor's statement, the Park district was agreeable to acquiring the Sampson

property on that basis, in which case the property west of Mrs. Sampson's as far as the present business district would be zoned for business use.

All of the property owners present at the meeting with the mayor were agreeable to the general idea of such a plan providing that the amount of property used for such a park and the distribution of the expense would be fair and equitable. To date, nothing further has been discussed with the property owners west of Linden avenue.

It is my thought that some such plan would be an excellent solution of the problem in question and would be advantageous to the city as a whole as well as to afford relief for the owners who have suffered loss in property values due to the business district being so close to them on the
