## GIANT LIZARD IS MUSEUM EXHIBIT

Replica of Huge Specimen Captured in South Seas By Expedition

A specimen of the giant prehensile-tailed skink, a large lizard that uses its tail monkey fashion in climbing trees, was placed on exhibition at Field Museum of Natural History today, it is announced by Stephen C. Simms, director. The exhibit is a reproduction made from an original specimen brought from the Solomon Islands in the south Pacific by the recent Cornelius Crane Pacific expedition of Field museum. The reproduction was made by a special process invented and perfected by Leon L. Walters of the museum's taxidermy staff, and is used instead of the original because this method enables more lifelike results to be produced than is possible by mounting the actual skin.

These Solomon island lizards, scientifically known as *Corucia zebrata* Gray, live an arboreal life, rarely descending to the ground, according to Earl P. Schmidt, assistant curator in charge of reptiles at the museum, who was scientific leader of the Crane expedition. They inhabit hollow trees, and are somewhat gregarious, several usually being found together in a single hollow. They have an extremely flexible and strongly prehensile tail, which, says Mr. Schmidt, is remarkable inasmuch as other members of the skink family have fragile tails and all the skinks are

encased in a bony armor underlying their scales. The giant skinks climb sluggishly about, feeding on the leaves of forest trees. They attain a length of about two feet. Natives of the Solomons use them for food.

## Home Bureau Organized by Farm Assn. Women
