Fake Solicitors are Reported Asking Aid

It is said that the group, claiming to represent a naval veterans' organization, have mulcted Waukegan people of several hundreds of dollars.

Abbott Laboratories Purchase Control of Swan-Myers Company

Announcement was made recently by the directorate of Abbott Laboratories, Inc., that the North Chicago concern has purchased the controlling interest in the Swan-Myers company, of Indianapolis. To acquire this new addition to the Abbott interests 25,000 shares of Abbott stock were used.

The Swan-Myers company is engaged in the drug manufacturing business as is Abbott Laboratories, Inc. Both have long been leaders in their particular fields.

At a recent meeting of the directors of Abbott Laboratories, October 21, it was proposed to increase the capital stock from 150,000 to 200,000 shares. Of the new stock 5,000 shares will be reserved for the employes of the company. An extra dividend, payable Nov. 1, was also declared.

A number of Lake Bluff residents hold good positions on the Abbott staff.

Local Entries Reported in Big Livestock Show

Entries have been made in different classes of the International Livestock show, to be held at the Chicago stockyards November 29 to December 6, by two of Lake county's leading farms, both situated in this part of the county, according to notices received by B. H. Heids, secretary of the exposition. One is Ken-Ro-Ka farm, Lake Forest, the property of Roy D. Kechn, and the other is Hawthorn farm, at Libertyville, owned by Samuel Insull. Ken-Ro-Ka farm will send a number of entries to the Clydesdale horse exhibit, in which several entries from this farm were winners in 1929. Hawthorn farm will exhibit twelve head of the Suffolk breed of English draft horses, it is announced.

AN ORDINANCE

REGULATING THE LOCATION, CONSTRUCTION, ERECTION, MAINTENANCE, OPERATION AND CONDUCT OF MINIATURE GOLF COURSES, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS,

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, as proprietor, agent, manager, owner or otherwise, to carry on, or conduct, the business of operating a public miniature golf course, in any place in said city for gain, either by direct charge, or by a club membership plan, or by any other indirect means whereby a charge is made, without first having obtained a permit and license so to do, as hereinafter provided, and complying with all the regulations and requirements herein contained.

Section 2. Any person desiring to carry on said business in said city, shall file a written application with the Building Inspector thereof, for a permit and license so to do. Said application shall be signed by the applicant; shall state his true and/or fictitious name and address; and shall set forth the exact location at which it is proposed to conduct said business. It shall show also the names of all partners, directors, trustees and/or all other persons proposed to be connected, directly or indirectly, with the conduct and/or operation of said business, with their present addresses.

Section 3. Every person owning, conducting, or maintaining a public miniature golf course, for gain or a fixed charge, or otherwise, in said city, shall pay to said city a license fee of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) per year in advance.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate, conduct or keep open for patronage, any miniature golf course between the hours of twelve o'clock midnight and seven o'clock A.M. of the following morning, and all lights on such premises shall be turned out, and kept turned out, between said hours, except such lights as are absolutely necessary, for police protection; and no operator or owner of any such golf course, nor his agents, servants or employees shall work or tamper said course between said hours; provided, however, that no miniature golf course, any part of which is within three hundred feet (300') of any residence apartment house or other dwelling shall be kept open between the hours of 10 o'clock P.M. of one day and 7 o'clock A.M. of the following day, and provided further that if the consents of the owners of a majority of the lineal front feet in the city block wherein the said golf course is situated are obtained, and also if the consents of the owners of a majority of the lineal front feet adjacent to and extending for three hundred feet (300') on each side of the said miniature golf course are obtained, it shall then be lawful to operate said miniature golf course until midnight and after 7:00 A.M. of the following morning.

Section 5. The city council of said city is hereby empowered to revoke the permit to carry on such business upon receiving satisfactory evidence of the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance or any other law or ordinance of said city, or any law of the State of Illinois, in connection with the conduct of said business, or that said business is being conducted and/or operated in a disorderly manner.

Whenever a permit shall have been revoked under the terms of this ordinance no other application by such person to carry on a similar business in said city shall be considered for a period of one (1) year from the date of such revocation.

Section 6. Any person violating any of the aforesaid provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for each offense; and each day's violation thereof shall be deemed a separate offense.

Section 7. The word "person," as used in this ordinance, shall include the singular and plural, also, firm, company, corporation, co-partnership, association, club, society or any other organization.
