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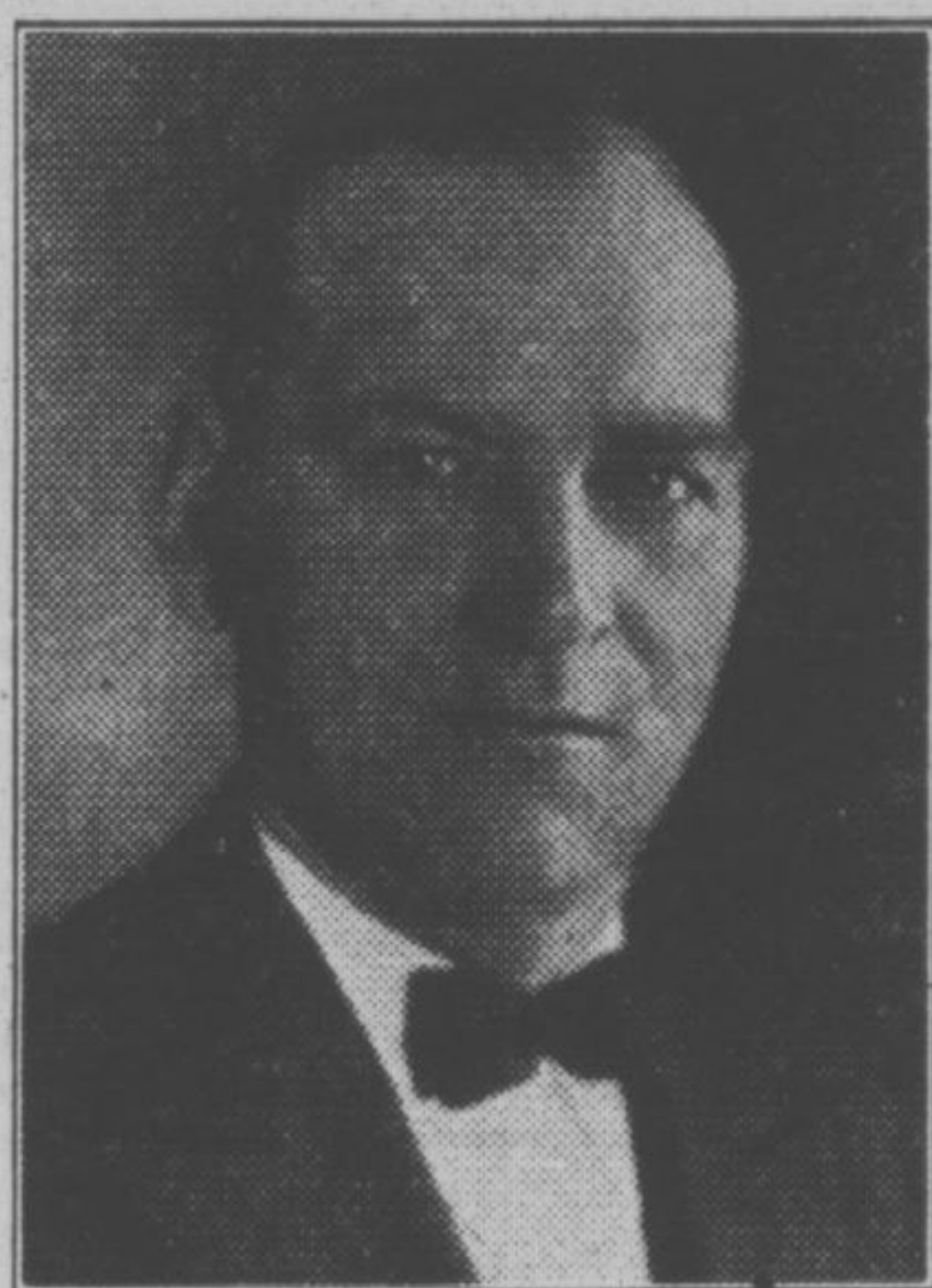

COUNTY G. O. P. WINS TIFFANY IS SHERIFF

All Rep. Candidates Elected
Tuesday; Chindblom May Be
Safe; McDonough Loses

Deerfield township, along with the remainder of the county and state exhibited a marked reduction in the Republican vote at Tuesday's election, but all of the Republican county candidates received majorities in the county and are elected. With only one or two exceptions Deerfield pre-

incts gave majorities for the Republican county candidates, but these majorities were greatly reduced from those of normal year elections.

Late returns this morning assured the re-election of Carl R. Chindblom congressman in the tenth district, although in early returns it looked as though his opponent, John Hesse, Democrat, was a possible winner. With 19 Chicago precincts missing his plurality is 2282, and it is estimated that he will win by about 1500. Lake County gave him a plurality of 4630. The north shore suburbs, including Lake county, gave him a plurality of about 15,000 votes, which overcame the lead of his opponent in Cook county.

In the senatorial race Lake county supported Lewis with a degree of generosity that it did not show to the county ticket. In 68 precincts here he received 15,915, McCormick 9,154 and O'Neill 1,022. Lewis had a large plurality in Deerfield township.

Tiffany Wins

Chief of Police Lester Tiffany, of Lake Forest, after a fight that kept interest at a high peak up to midnight, today was returned a winner by more than 3,000 votes over Herbert Yager, of Waukegan, the democratic nominee for sheriff.

With Tiffany the entire republican ticket swept into office, but it was not by the majorities that had been predicted or hoped for by the G.O.P. on the eve of Nov. 3 as the demo-
