

DOINGS OF LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS

Food Sale Planned; Discussion of Dues Increase; Radio Programs

At the last meeting of the Highland Park League of Women Voters, Mrs. Constant Hopkins, president, announced a food sale to be given by the league on Saturday, Nov. 22. The place will be announced later.

Members of the league are reminded that a vote on raising dues will be taken at the next meeting on Nov. 19. Mrs. Hopkins announced that the Highland Park board after careful consideration, had recommended that the dues be raised to \$3.00. A letter was read from the state finance chairman explaining the need for 100 per cent cooperation from the local leagues. Each local member at present costs the State league \$3.22. It seems only logical officials believe, that this amount should be approximated by the sum turned in to the state every year by each local league, as the local leagues of course could not exist without the national and state organizations. They not only formulate the programs and supply direction and inspiration, but with the help of their trained workers, they have accumulated an impressive store of authoritative literature in the form of small booklets and pamphlets which may be secured very cheaply.

Many Advantages

The proposed increase in dues seems very small compared to the advantages derived from membership in the league, local league leaders feel. "The Illinois Voter," the monthly magazine which is included in the dues, is full of valuable information, and at the monthly meetings members may hear state and federal measures discussed by qualified speakers. The league has begun this fall its election program which it expects to carry out at all elections with the hope of stimulating an interest in the vote by supply—non-partisan in-
