

FEDERAL BUILDING FOR H. P. PROSPECT

Senator Glenn Expects Action By Next Session of Congress on Plan

That there is prospect of the long-desired Federal building for Highland Park is soon to advance a step nearer realization is indicated in a dispatch from Washington to the Highland Park Press stating that Senator Otis Glenn has hopes of this matter being included in the bill of appropriations for federal building sites to be presented at the next session of congress.

It should be explained here that the experience of other cities in Illinois has been that the securing of government action in such matters is usually a long process. However, as the dispatch indicates, there is in this instance, because of the existing economic depression, a belief that congress may be willing to slash "red tape" to some extent to provide work for the unemployed by advancing bills for government buildings, and Highland Park may next year at least see a start made in the direction of a government post office building here. DEERFIELD HIGH IS BEATEN BY WAUKEGAN

Crippled Eleven of Local School Loses Last Saturday; Play Evanston Next

Waukegan high school's fighting grid machine proved too strong for Deerfields crippled eleven and took home an easy 15 to 0 victory from the loser's field last Saturday.

Christensen, Purple and Gold half-back, was the big noise in the winner's offense, while Bartlett once more starred in the Deerfield backfield. Waukegan had a big advantage in the kicking department, Christensen repeatedly outkicking his rivals.

This superiority along with a decided edge in passing was responsible for the Waukegan victory, their third over the locals in 17 years.

First Quarter

Deerfield opened the first quarter with the wind at their backs and soon had the ball down within the scoring zone, here the visitors line stiffened and Deerfield's golden opportunity was lost. In the second quarter the winners started their scoring. Worthington punting from behind his own goal line was unable to get his kick off and Waukegan led 2 to 0. Later in this quarter a pass, Christensen to Setrakian, was good for a touchdown and Christensen added the extra point with a place kick.

Prior to his boys work activities Mr. Boltz was dealer service representative for the Morris Packing company of Chicago.
