

N. S. SANITARY DIST. PLANS BOND ISSUE

**Special Election to Be Held;
H. P. and Lake Forest May
Get New Plants**

Final arrangements for the holding of the election on the proposed \$1,500,000 bond issue to provide for the erection of a large disposal plant in Waukegan and five smaller units in other towns in the county, are now being made by members of the North Shore Sanitary District board.

The election will be held during the second week in December, presumably on Dec. 13, although the date has not been definitely fixed.

Consultations are now being held with attorneys, engineers and representatives of banking interests relative to the issuance and disposal of the bonds in the event that they are approved by the voters.

An educational campaign to inform voters of the merits of the proposi-

tion will be launched this week, John Oliver the president said.

New disposal plants or extensive additions to existing plants will be effected under the bond issue at Waukegan, Winthrop Harbor, Zion, North Chicago, Lake Bluff, Highland Park and Lake Forest.

Considerable opposition to the Waukegan project has developed, primarily over division of cost of an intercepting sewer, says the Waukegan Times, continuing:

"Consulting engineers for the sanitary district recommended location on the north flats. City officials asked that the district board assume part of the burden of the \$250,000 sewer or build the plant on the south side, where a much less expensive sewer line would serve.

"Health officials and citizens of shore line towns below Waukegan are insistent that immediate relief be provided. They point out that two-thirds of Waukegan's sewage, including industrial waste, is dumped into the lake untreated.
