The superintendent's report shows total admissions of 1,322 patients and a total of 9,417 patient days; major operations, 183; minors, 384; total, 567; auto accidents taken care of, 34; other accidents, 66; care, dressings; etc., were given 742 persons; in the obstretrical department 239 mothers were admitted; births, boys, 125; girls, 116; laboratory examinations, 6,898; in the baby clinic 1,127 examinations were made; new mother, 184; largest day, 39 examinations; in the dental clinic 99 children received 575 treatments.
