John Rockensock, 64 years old, died recently at his farm home, a short distance west of Wauconda. Surviving him are his widow, Anna Rockensock, and one small child.

Police of Libertyville and members of the sheriff's office last week were searching for a bandit who held up Mrs. Elizabeth Woods of Libertyville and obtained \$10 and a purse from her.

Mrs. Jeanette Jacobs, wife of Mr. Henry Jacobs, 1816 South Park avenue, and a resident of North Chicago for the past 14 years, passed away at her home last week following a long illness.

Deputy Game Warden Henry Kern stated last week that he had warrants for the arrest of eight Lake county residents on charges of shipping furs after last season's deadline for hunting without making a monthly report.

Thomas H. McKinney, 69, of 1804 Lincoln street, North Chicago, one of that city's pioneers and most prominent citizens, died at the family home recently. Mr. McKinney had been ill for the past eighteen months, and succumbed to a heart attack.

After being trailed from Chicago, through Lake county and Waukegan, Max Plan, a jewelry salesman of 29 East Madison street, Chicago, was held up and robbed of jewelry valued at \$40,000 by two armed men on Sheridan road near the state line last week.

Appointment of a committee to direct the work of relief among unemployed in Waukegan and North Chicago, was made last week by J. E. Sams, president of the Waukegan and North Chicago chamber of commerce, in accordance with a decision reached at the meeting of representatives of civic and social organizations.

Breaking of a steering knuckle, which caused the auto to turn over into the ditch, resulted in instant death for Morris Dyke, 26, of Twenty Second street, North Chicago, on Green Bay road, four miles north of Grand avenue.

**Final Hearing on
Lake Zurich Case
Is Set for Nov. 21**

Final hearing on the case of August Froelich, president of the Village of Lake Zurich, and Margaret Pierce, to enjoy all but property owners from trespassing on the waters of Lake Zurich, has been set for November 21 by Circuit Judge Edward Shurtleff.

The court, at that time will hear exceptions to the report of Ralph J. Dady, master-in-chancery, who held

that the lake was private and that boating, fishing and hunting privileges could be restricted through the owners of the land.

Hundreds of summer residents of the village, mostly Chicagoans, banded to fight the decision because it would rob them of enjoying the lake which induced them, they claimed, to settle there originally.

Since the Dady report, Diamond lake was held to be private property by the state.

**H. P. Man Is Named by
Gov. Emmerson on Board**

Governor Louis L. Emmerson last week appointed Alfred C. Meyers of Highland Park as a member of the Board of Public Welfare Commissioners to succeed Harry Lurie of Chicago, who resigned to join the bureau of the Jewish Social Research association of New York City, necessitating his departure from Illinois.

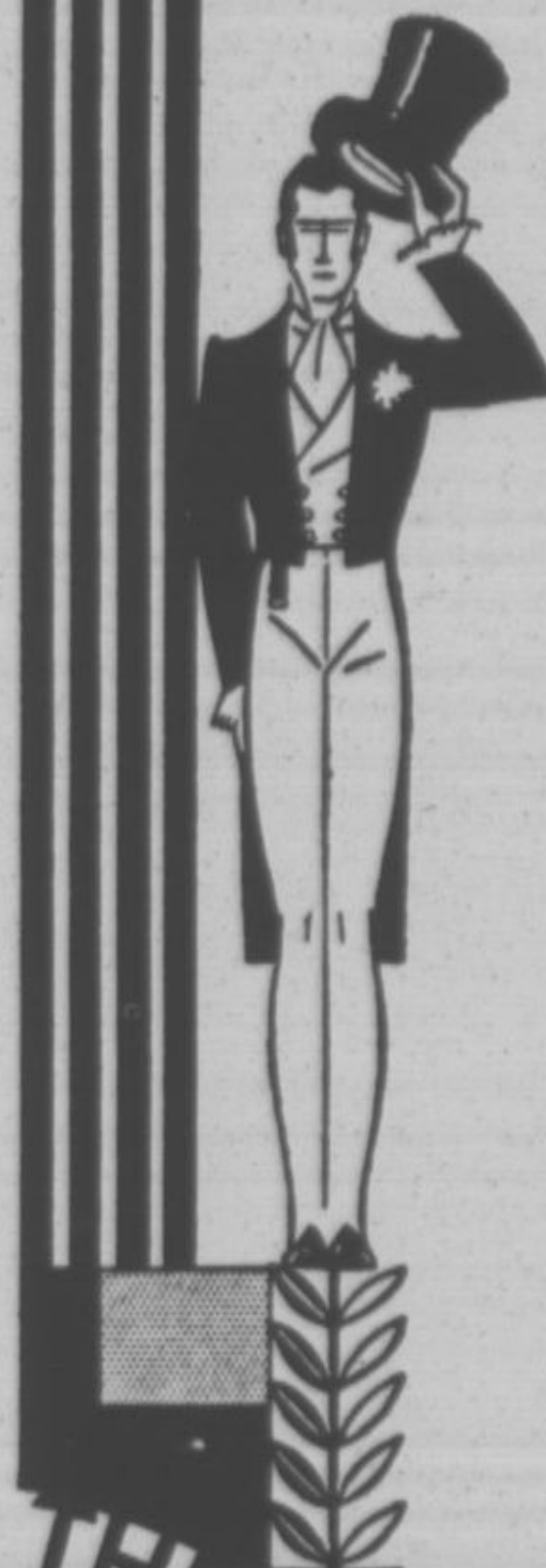
