erats, active for the first time since 1906 with a county ticket, made a wonderful fight.

#### Petty Leads Ticket

W. C. Petty, of Antioch, candidate for county superintendent of schools, led the county republican ticket for offices, for some of which there was no opposition. While he was piling up 15,883 votes in 68 of the 71 precincts, his opponent, Mrs. Frances Moody, of Highland Park, was receiving 6,745 votes, or 9,138 less than the victor, according to returns Wednesday afternoon.

County Treasurer Jay B. Morse of Libertyville, with a vote of 14,748, led his opponent, Peter Duffy of Deerfield, by 7,775 votes. Duffy got a total of 6,973 in 68 precincts.

County Clerk Lew A. Hendee, who has served since 1910, defeated Joseph Daly, of Waukegan, 15,225 to 8,012, giving him a majority of 7,213,

while County Judge P. L. Persons, who also took office in 1910, romped away from Attorney Joseph Jadrich, of North Chicago, 15,445 to 7,190 for a lead of 8,255.

Tiffany received 15,365 votes in 68 precincts against 12,214 for Yager for a 3,151 margin.

Tiffany left Wednesday on a week's vacation. No announcement was made by him on his appointments. He has resigned as chief of police of Lake Forest, and his brother, Frank Tiffany, North Chicago chief, is to succeed him in Lake Forest.

#### Several Unopposed

Lee McDonough, of Waukegan, was defeated for re-election as state representative, as returns from McHenry and Boone counties disclosed that his support was insufficient to reach the Richard J. Lyons or Thomas Bolger totals.

McHenry, which went without representation in the lower house last term, today can enjoy what Lake county held for two years when McDonough and Lyons held seats, as its Democratic candidate, Thomas Bolger, of McHenry, was returned a certain winner, and Attorney William A. Carroll, of Woodstock, as high man.

With but four precincts missing in the entire district of Lake, McHenry and Boone counties Carroll was shown to have 31,241 votes, Lyons 30,646, Bolger 29,083 and McDonough 26,855.

is the emblem of the Chippewa Indian. They chose the oak leaf, because the oak tree is the king of the forest.

The Indian believes that man grew like a tree, and that when he is ill, it is because he is out of rhythm with nature.

The three musical instruments of the Indians are the flute, tom-tom, and the rattler.

Although the American Indian had taken part in every war fought by the white man on this continent, it was not until 1923 that he was given the right of citizenship and of voting. After seventeen thousand Indians fought in the front line trenches in France and one hundred fifty of them were given medals for their service, they were awarded the right of voting here.

In his songs, dramatic readings, and dances, Chief Chibiaboos delighted his audience. He was very ably and sympathetically accompanied by Mrs. John R. Todd.
