He specializes in snow scenes and Highland Park's hills and dales will give him a splendid opportunity for landscapes. I want some of them for myself and will help him create a market for others."

Carroll Leads Vote for Representative in Eighth District

Complete returns from all of the 116 precincts in Lake, Boone and McHenry counties give William M. Carroll of McHenry first place in the fight for the Assembly from the Eighth District with 32,724. Richard J. Lyons, of Mundelein and Lake county's only representative-elect, is second with 31,849 1/2 votes. Thomas A. Bolger of McHenry county, the only democrat, is the third to gain a seat in the Assembly with 30,635.

Lee McDonough of Waukegan is 2.365 votes behind Bolger with 28,-270 votes in the three counties.

The official count in McHenry county gave Lyons 4,6761/2, McDonough 2,3701/2, Carroll 17,2951/2 and Bolger 8,5971/2. Boone county gave Lyons 2,854, McDonough 1,7161/2, Carroll 5,139 and Bolger 1,6741/2.

The Lake county unofficial vote is 24,319 for Lyons, 24,183 for Mc-Donough, 10,289 1/2 for Carroll and 20,373 for Bolger.
