

"Africa Speaks" Shown at Deerpath Saturday; Other Great Pictures

"Africa Speaks," which comes to the Deerpath theatre, Lake Forest, Saturday, is a graphic motion picture and sound record of a trip taken by Paul L. Hoeffler through the hitherto unexplored regions of Africa, with the Colorado African Expedition.

As the expedition sped along the roads, herds of wildebeeste, kongoni and tommies were encountered. Such gorgeous bits of natural beauty as the Ripon Falls, source of the Victoria Nile, were photographed by Hoeffler's cameramen.

Two weeks spent among the pygmies of the Ituri forest resulted in some remarkably intimate motion

picture studies of these mysterious little people of whom the civilized world knows little. At Dikwa, in Northern Nigeria, Hoeffler and his party were entertained royally by the Emir of Dikwa himself, who met them with a native brass band and feasted them in kingly style.

Annual State Convention

Perhaps the high point of the four-day conference will be the convention dinner Wednesday evening, at which Chester Rowell of California, lecturer and publicist, and Albert J. Harno, Dean of the Law school of the University of Illinois, will speak on Adult Education. Mrs. Ralph Treadway will also give her president's address at this time.

On Monday evening, there will be an open forum at which Henry Chand-

ler, chairman of the Child Welfare Legislative commission, will discuss recommendations to be made to the General Assembly. Mrs. J. Hewitt Rosenstiel of Freeport and the National League, will speak on "The League of Women Voters' Status in the United States." Mrs. Ralph Treadway will preside on this evening.

Other Speakers

At the Committee Conferences on Tuesday, J. W. Garner, head of the department of Political Science, will speak on "The Relation of the United States to Latin-America," and Professor C. A. Berdahl on "The League of Nations in the Party Politics of the United States" before the Department of International Co-operation. On the Department of Efficiency in Government, Dr. C. M. Knier will speak on "County Government," and Mrs. Guy Tawney on "How we secured a city manager for Cincinnati." Other speakers of the committee sessions will be Dr. Mollie Ray Carroll, of the University of Chicago, Dr. Rachele S. Yarros, director of the Institute on Social Hygiene, Professor J. M. Mathews and O. J. Weber of the School of Education of the University of Illinois.

In addition to these afternoon meetings, the Institute on Public Finance and Taxation, arranged by the Economics Department of the University of Illinois, will be a distinctive feature. The three mornings will be given over to this program.
