**Interesting Happenings About

Henry Stratton, 81, one of the early settlers in Lake county and for many years a resident of Fremont, died recently in Chicago.

O. Samuelson of Chicago, was arrested last week on the Thomas Mogg farm on Belvidere road, two miles west of Thomas Corners, on a charge of shooting pheasants and rabbits out of season. The arrest was made by Deputy Sheriff Robert A. Haley of Gages Lake.

Petitions of 419 legal voters of the Waukegan Township High School district calling for a special election to authorize the erection of a \$150,000 vocational school addition at the high school was presented to the board of education last week.

There are 2,009 students enrolled in the Waukegan Township high school and 4,437 in the grade schools of the city of Waukegan, according to reports submitted at the meetings of the two boards of education.

Release of Henry "Hank" Vogler, proprietor of the Golden Gate, a roadhouse located on Sheridan road, near the state line, from the house of correction in Milwaukee will take place on November 18.

Mrs. Priscilla Fenton, formerly of Wauconda, died recently at the St. Francis hospital in Evanston as a result of injuries sustained in an automobile accident at Niles Center. John Fenton, her husband, was killed in the same accident.

Onesimo Lugo, 24, of North Chicago, late yesterday was sentenced to serve 75 days in the state prison farm at Vandalia, on a charge of slashing Fred W. Johnson, also of North Chicago.

George "Bugs" Moran, erstwhile Chicago gang leader, will probably escape some of the preliminary hearings on the three charges on which he is out on \$15,000 bond, it was indicated by State's Attorney A. V. Smith, who stated that information would be filed in county court for hearings before Judge Perry L. Persons on Nov. 18.

**Lake County Votes Wet
on Three Propositions**

Lake county joined the rest of the state on the question of public policy with relation to the prohibition question, showing better than two to one on each of the three questions in the final tabulation.

Of 5,021 of the 7,109 precincts in the state, including Lake county's election returns, there were 789,813 votes for repeal of the 18th Amendment and 319,216 against repeal. So far 753,942 votes were recorded for modification of the Volstead act with 282,156 against modification. The repeal of the state prohibition act was asked by 800,598 voters with 306,468 against repeal.

**Police Radio System
for North Shore Towns,
Plan Being Discussed**

Establishments of a radio system that will link all of the police departments in four countries along the North Shore in one vast broadcasting chain for the distribution of alarms and warnings is now regarded as a possibility through the furtherance of a plan providing for the use of radio station WCBD of Zion, says the Waukegan Times.

Administrations of all cities and villages in the four countries will be petitioned to approve the plan and to appropriate sums toward maintenance of the station, according to Waukegan newspapers.

Long Agitated

Formation of a system for dissemination of police news along the North Shore has long been agitated and has had the approval of heads of all police departments in these communities. Installation of a teletype system that would connect with the Chicago police department has been discussed but it has not been approved due to the cost.

The matter of using the Zion radio station would have to await for the approval of Wilbur Glenn Voliva, however.

Cost Estimated

Cost of installing a low wave panel at WCBD is estimated at a \$10,000 by officials of the Wextark Radio corporation, through Charles R. Topp, Lake Forest. All squad cars in the cities co-operating, as well as county sheriffs' machines, would be equipped with receiving sets.

Maintenance cost would be about \$60 per month for cities the size of Waukegan, after initial expense of installation, it is estimated. Receivers for squad cars would cost about \$100 per car.

A fine specimen of the wolverino, from Alaska, is on exhibition at Field Museum of Natural History.
