Of 5,021 of the 7,109 precincts in the state, including Lake county's election returns, there were 789,813 votes for repeal of the 18th Amendment and 319,216 against repeal. So for 753,942 votes were recorded for modification of the Volstead act with 282,156 against modification. The repeal of the state prohibition act was asked by 800,598 voters with 306,468 against repeal.
