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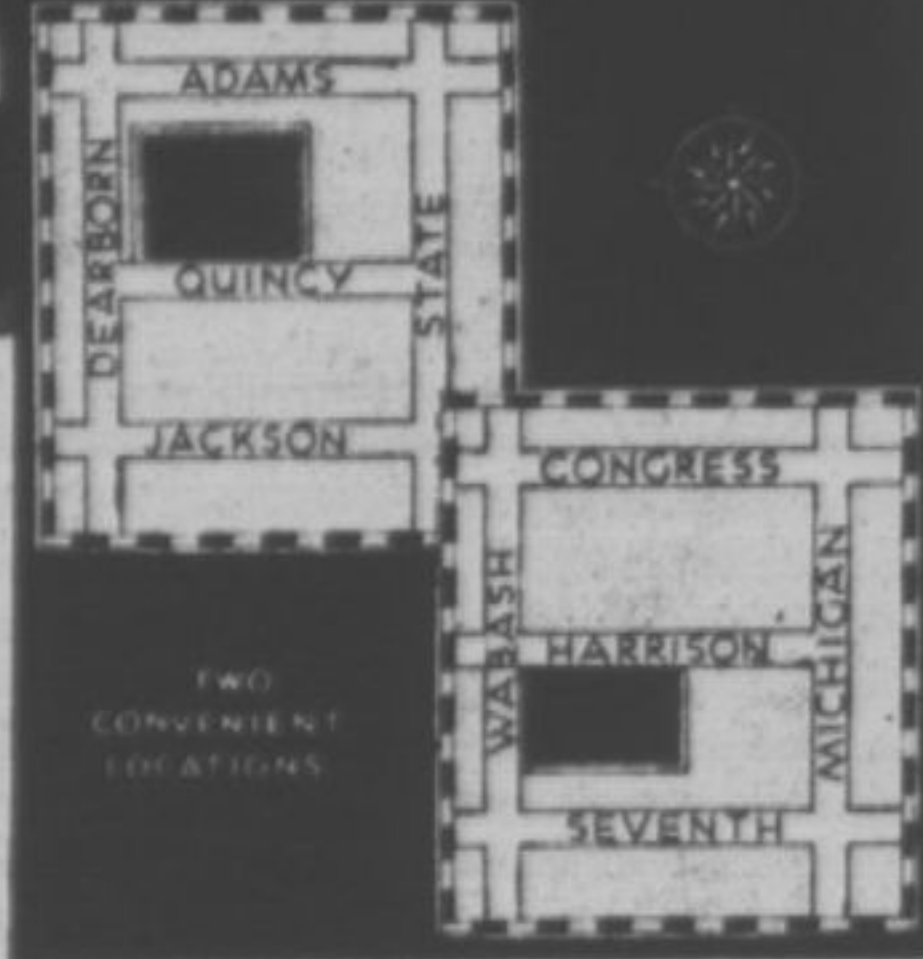

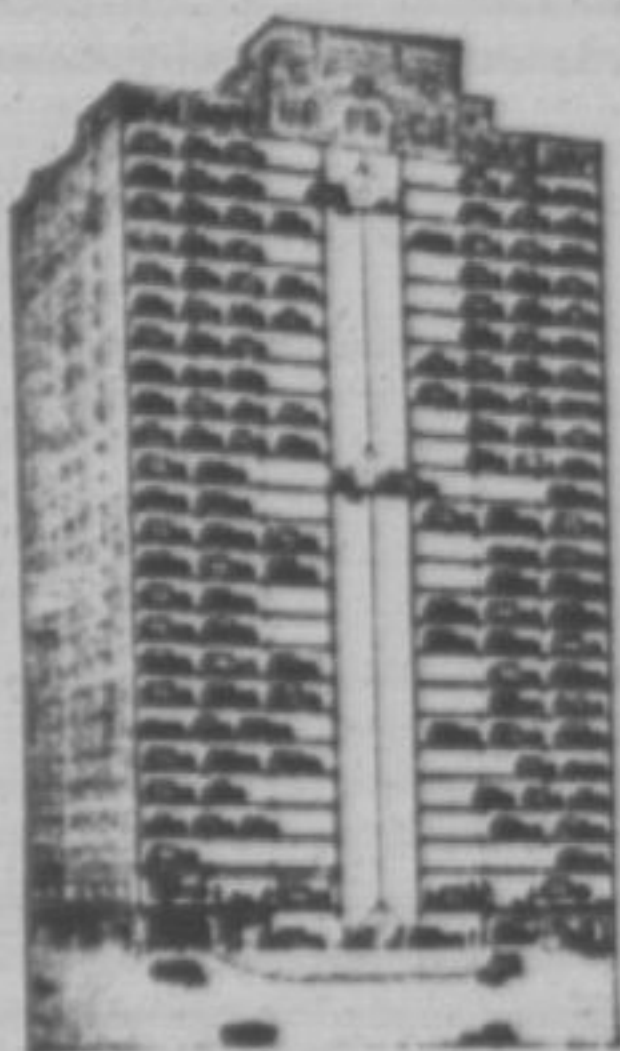

CREDIT BUYING WAS KNOWN TO EGYPTIANS

Collection of Examples of Ancient Writing in Museum Shows Proof

Evidence that something similar to the modern "dollar down and dollar a month" method of buying things may have been in existence in ancient Egypt has been found in a collection of examples of Egyptian writing and writing equipment which has been placed on exhibition at Field Museum of Natural History.

In deciphering a number of the inscribed tablets, boards, limestone flakes and potsherds, Dr. T. George Allen, assistant curator of Egyptian archaeology, came upon one which proved to be a receipt for a series of payments made by a man named Pedikhonsu, in the year 30 of some Ptolemaic or Roman ruler of Egypt. The receipt suggested that Pedikhonsu had purchased something on an installment plan.

Wooden Tags

Also included in the collection are wooden shipping tags which had been attached to mummies of persons who had died away from home, for use in transporting the bodies to their relatives; legal documents inscribed on limestone flakes, one bearing part of an oath reading "by this bull and every god who dwells with him" to establish the case of a litigant; and a limestone stela bearing a prayer to the gods "that they may give a mortuary offering of bread and beer, oxen and geese, and everything good and pure whereon a god lives to the spirit of the laundryman of Amon, Nebseni."

In addition there are exhibited the palettes and pens used by scribes.

"The earliest Egyptian writing equipment consisted of a cylindrical pen case, a rectangular palette with cups for sakes of black and red ink; and a pan for water to dissolve the ink," state Dr. Allen. "Soot was used in making black ink; red was made from an iron oxide. Pens were slender reeds tufted by chewing; in Ptolemaic times heavier hollow reeds were used their ends being beveled and the points split like modern pens.

Flora of Yucatan Shown in Field Museum Display

"Flora of Yucatan" is the latest of the scientific publications issuing from the department of botany of Field Museum of Natural History. In it are listed and described 129 families, 667 genera, and 1,263 species of plants which grow in Yucatan. Paul C. Standley, associate curator of the barbarium of the museum, is the author. The book, containing 492 pages, is printed by Field Museum Press.
