

Inquest in Fox Lake Killings Is Finished; Nothing Is Revealed

A Lake county coroner's jury last week completed their inquest into the Fox Lake massacre, in which three gangsters were shot to death and two badly wounded, and recommended that the state's attorney's office continue its investigation of the case.

The inquest has been at a virtual standstill for several weeks to permit State's Attorney A. V. Smith's staff to gather information about the shooting which occurred in a roadhouse May 31. The jury returned an open verdict.

Securing satisfactory evidence was balked by additional assassination in Chicago recently. The racketeers, killed in the roadhouse last May were Sam Peller, Joe Bertsche and Mike Quirk. Other gangsters were there but were successful in eluding efforts was accidentally killed while trying to grill them.

Working on the theory that Quirk put his companion on the spot,

Col. A. V. Smith's investigation along these channels came to a deadlock because of recent killings.

Although many witnesses appeared before the jury, Dr. John L. Taylor stated that little of value was garnered from them. Only Mrs. Vivian Ponic and George Druggan, who were wounded in the massacre, avoided appearing before the inquisitorial body. They also refused to divulge information to the state's attorney.
