Nineteen members of the Deerfield Presbyterian church served a supper of Baked Beans and Wieners to 225 jobless and homeless men at the Olivet institute, Chicago, last Wednesday evening. In six cars the party left Deerfield about 7 p.m. Upon arriving at the institute all hands were soon busily engaged in slicing and buttering bread, cooking wieners and heating the beans. At 9 p.m. the hungry men filed into the dining room and stood at their chairs while the doxology was sung. The 15 tables were served with dispatch and the coffee poured. At the conclusion of the meal a short, heartening service was conducted by Superintendent Barr and the Rev. M. J. Andrews after which the men repaired to the gymnasium of the institute, spread newspapers on the balcony floor and turned in for the night. Oatmeal, bread and butter, and coffee were left at the institute to be served for breakfast on Thursday morning.

The pastor of the church wishes to express his appreciation of the splendid work of the committee in charge of this enterprise, of the willing and whole hearted response of the members and friends of the congregation, and of those who donated their cars for the evening.
