Fireproof Warehouse has offered storage space for all supplies sent in for distribution to those needing help.

One of the very interesting things about this organization is that there will be no charge against any donations. A dollar donated to the Highland Park Social Service committee goes entirely for relief. While the organization has a paid secretary, that secretary's salary is paid by one of the local Highland Park organizations. The office space and the telephone were donated by the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce.

By coordinating the efforts of the various relief agencies, as well as providing an outlet for local organizations and residents who are able to assist, it is hoped to simplify and speed up relief work as well as prevent duplication of effort.

Every care is being taken to relieve those in need and every opportunity is being given those who wish to help through this clearing house.

How to Help

All organizations and individuals with work to offer or clothing and supplies to give, are asked to notify the secretary at once.

Those who are in need of work or other help should register at the Central avenue office. All cases reported will be promptly investigated. Legitimate cases will be cared for through the Social Service committee's resources when possible or assigned to such other organizations as have signified their willingness to care for the type of case in question.

Make Relief Work Easier

The committee has no intention of putting on a drive for funds or in any other way duplicating the efforts of regular relief organizations, but in case anyone wishes to make a public subscription it will be accepted and spent with the utmost care. The sole purpose of the committee is to facilitate the work of the regular relief organizations and to provide a convenient point of contact between those in need of help and those with help to offer.

Those organizations that wish to take an active part in this relief work should appoint a member who can represent them at the meetings of the Social Service committee. The names and phone numbers of such persons should be filed with the committee as soon as possible.
