

North Shore & Milwaukee Railroad, and the westerly boundary of the right-of-way for the new State Highway No. 57, and between the south boundary of the City and the north line of Section 34, Township 43, Range 12, shall be zoned for commercial use, except the following described property, which shall be zoned for business use:

(a) That part of the Southwest Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of Section 35, Township 43 North, Range 12 East of the Third Principal Meridian, described as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a point in the center line of Section 35, Township 43 North, Range 12, where said center line intersects with the easterly right-of-way line of the Chicago North Shore & Milwaukee Railroad; thence north along said easterly line of said Chicago North Shore & Milwaukee Railroad 1-1/2 feet; thence east on a line parallel to the center line of said Section 35, to the point of intersection of the said parallel line with the westerly line of the proposed right-of-way State Route 57; thence southeasterly along said westerly line of said proposed Route 57 1-1/2 feet to the center line of said Section 35; thence west along the center line of said Section 35, being the center line of Cluvey Road to the place of beginning, being the intersection of said center line with the easterly line of the Chicago, North Shore & Milwaukee Railroad right-of-way, all situated in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois.

(b) That part of the Northwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section 35, Township 43 North, Range 12 East of the Third Principal Meridian, described as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a point on the center line of said Section 35, Township 43 North, Range 12, East of the Third Principal Meridian, where said center line intersects with the westerly line of the right-of-way of proposed State Route 57; thence southeasterly along said right-of-way 1-1/2 feet; thence west along a line parallel to the said center line of said Section 35 to the point where said parallel line intersects the east line of the Chicago, North Shore & Milwaukee Railroad right-of-way; thence north along the east line of said Chicago, North Shore & Milwaukee Railroad right-of-way to a point where said east line of said Chicago, North Shore & Milwaukee Railroad right-of-way intersects with the center line of Section 35, Township 43 North, Range 12 East; thence east along said center line to the place of beginning, being the intersection of said center line with the westerly line of the right-of-way of proposed State Route 57.

(c) That part of the East One-Half of the Southwest Quarter of Section 35, Township 43 North, Range 12, East of the Third Principal Meridian, comprising part of Lot Two and part of Lot Three and part of Lot Four in the Subdivision of the West 22 1/2 Acres of the South 39 Acres of the East One-Half of said Southwest Quarter, described as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the intersection of the division County Line between Lake County and Cook County with the East Line of the Chicago, North Shore & Milwaukee Railroad right-of-way, thence Northwesterly along the said East Line of said right-of-way 200 feet, thence East on a line parallel to the said division line between Lake County and Cook County to the point of intersection of said parallel line with the Westerly boundary line of the proposed right-of-way for State Route 57; thence Southeasterly along said West line of said right-of-way as proposed, 200 feet to the center line of County Line Road, being the division line between Lake County and Cook County, thence West along said County Line to the place of beginning, being the intersection of said County Line with the East Line of the Chicago, North Shore & Milwaukee Railroad right-of-way, all situated in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois.

At said public hearing an opportunity will be afforded to all persons interested in the changes above mentioned to be heard in relation to said proposed amendments.

### L. F. High School Case Goes to Supreme Court

The Lake Forest high school case in which the validity of the amendment to the township high school law under which the new Lake Forest High School district was created is in question, was on Tuesday appealed to the Illinois supreme court from the decision of Judge Shurtleff rendered against the establishment of the district several weeks ago.

The move to form a new district at Lake Forest was opposed in the circuit court by the Deerfield-Shields high school board and both districts will be represented by attorneys in the hearing before the higher court.
