CIRCUIT THEATRE IS TO CONTINUE

Financial Aid Assured, Manager Announces; First Play in Early December

That the North Shore Circuit theatre should and will continue to produce plays acted by amateurs on the north shore was the unanimous decision of the board of directors in session last Friday at the home of Samuel S. Otis, president of the organization.

The fate of this little theatre has been hanging in the balance since Nov. 1, on which date the very active subscription campaign officially ended, with its quota of subscribers short of expectations. Business depression seemed not to have skipped the amateur theatre business in its power over the country, and the board announced at that time, in view of the unbalanced budget, that an extra campaign would be conducted immediately, and that unless something was accomplished to insure the way, the season's work of the Circuit theatre would have to be dropped, and the organization would go out of existence.

Friends Come to Rescue

John Allen Stewart, business manager, in announcing the decision to continue, said, "After making known its imminent closing of doors, the North Shore Circuit theatre has had many of its friends hasten to come to the rescue. Subscriptions to the organization have been sent to the office in most encouraging numbers, and word is had daily of many who will subscribe, having held off until such time as the ultimate decision to continue or not was made. Another group who had already subscribed for the year have expressed regret at the passing of what is truly a north shore institution, and some of them, interested to the point of action, have contributed to a special guarantee fund to insure the production of the customary four plays during the winter."

First Play

Accordingly, production work is being pressed on "Nellie, the Beautiful Cloak Model," the 1880 melodrama which has been announced as the first production of the season. "Nellie" will open on Dec. 5, and will be presented in each town on the regular north shore circuit.

To Be Given Later

"Nellie, the Beautiful Cloak Model" will be followed in January by a production of Bartlett Cormack's famous play about Chicago gangland, "Racket," and in March by "A Bit O' Love," one of the best of the famous plays by John Galsworthy. The May production will be of a light, happy drawing-room comedy, an always popular type, and subscribers are invited to send in their suggestions for this play which is as yet unselected. Of prime interest at present, however, is the fact that the Circuit theatre is to live, and that its tenth season of a well-rounded, interesting and worth-while repertory of plays will very soon be an actuality.

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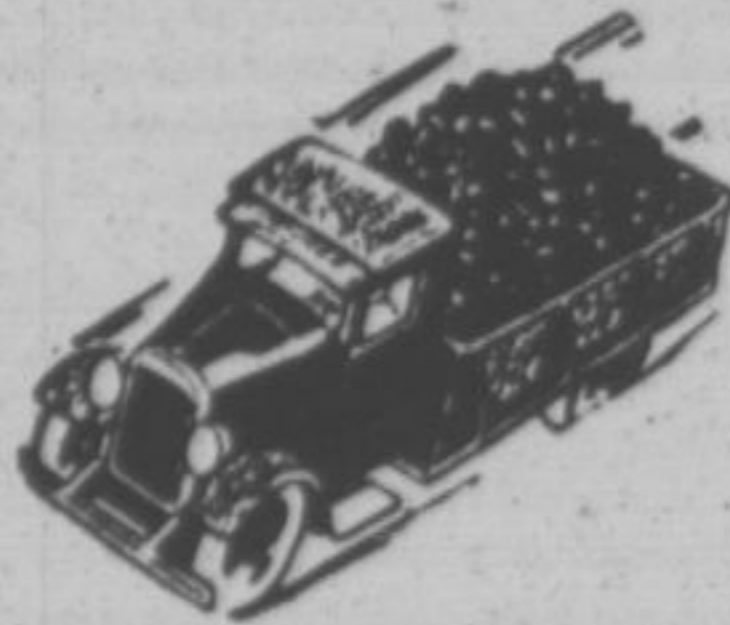
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
