

H. P. WOMEN ATTEND LEAGUE CONVENTION

Report Instructive Program at Annual Meeting of Voters League, at Urbana

About 200 women representing 60 local leagues, gathered from all parts of the state last week, to attend the 10th anniversary convention of the Illinois League of Women Voters, held at Urbana. The convention was combined with an Institute of Government held at the Illinois university, and conducted by such able men as Henry P. Chandler, chairman, Ill. committee on child welfare; Prof. M. H. Hunter, Department of Economics, University of Ill.; J. W. Garner, Prof. Political Science; Albert J. Harno, Dean of the Law School, and others.

The very interesting convention program combined with the unusual by balmy weather, and the charm of a university town, made this anniversary stand out as one of great pleasure and significance.

Two committee chairmen from Highland Park: Mrs. Walker, Child Welfare, and Mrs. Simons, Legal Status of Women, attended luncheons at which those particular subjects were discussed. Mrs. Sherer and Mrs. Glidden, also delegates from Highland Park, heard Dr. Rachelle Yarros talk on social hygiene. Dinners covering the following subjects were given on Tuesday: Efficiency in Government, attended by Mrs. Hopkins; Legal Status of Women, attended by Mrs. Glidden and Mrs. Simons; and International Co-operation, attended by Mrs. Walker and Mrs. Sherer.

Sessions of the league were held every afternoon, at which officers were elected, revisions to the by-laws voted upon, reports heard from committee chairmen, and plans discussed for the program of work for the coming year.

A program for the study of unemployment was adopted. The proposal to increase dues was rejected.

Women on Juries

Now that the women-on-juries referendum has been won, the league will assist in securing names of women eligible for jury service, and will print a pamphlet explaining the duties of jurors.

"Follow Through" color comedy about the love affairs of a golf instructor. Over emphasizes Charles Roger's as being irresistible to all women. Not recommended for children.

"Clancy in Wall Street," very funny farce in the true Charles Murray style. Irish plumber with Scotch partner speculates in stocks. Funny and harmless for children.

"Good News" screen version of musical comedy is not as fine a production, has dancing and singing in abundance and would be regarded as fair entertainment for the family, some vulgarities prevent its full endorsement.

"Office Wife" rather mediocre and dull story with unwholesome plot. Not for youths or children.

"The Spoilers" story by Rex Beach of Alaska Gold Rush. Very good character acting and a long and violent fight between two men featured. Very good and thrilling picture of its kind but may be found altogether too exciting for immature audiences.

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
