

TIFFANY DEPUTIES NAMED; KENNEDY 1ST

Waukegan Chief to Be Chief Aide of New Sheriff; Sid Burrige to Be Bailiff

Assistant Chief of Police Thomas E. Kennedy, of Waukegan, who has been on the police force in that city nearly thirteen years, will become chief deputy sheriff to Sheriff Lester T. Tiffany Monday, it was revealed, when it was discovered that Kennedy had taken all precautions with the civil service commission to protect his standing, according to the Waukegan Times.

At the same time it was learned that Justice Sid Burrige, of Lake Forest, Ira Smith, Fremont township farmer, and Fred Brown former chief deputy sheriff under Lawrence Doolittle, would become deputies.

Burrige, it is said, will become bailiff in the court of Probate Judge Martin C. Decker, Smith will serve in County Judge Perry L. Persons' court, and Brown in circuit court.

Spellman Declines

Assessor John J. Spellman of Lake Forest, who has been mentioned as a likely candidate for chief deputy, will not be a member of Tiffany's staff. Mr. Spellman, it is understood, could have had a post with Tiffany, but he declined so that he could give his full time to his personal and public interests.

Deputy Sheriff Elmer Hudson is to continue as night turnkey at the county jail, it is said.

MANY DESTITUTE HERE IN NEED OF WORK

Social Service Committee Finds Families Facing Cold Without Fuel, Food, Clothing

The Social Service Committee, acting as a clearing house for unemployment relief and other charitable work in Highland Park and Highwood, report themselves amazed at the many cases of near and actual destitution that they find right here in our own community, and address the appeal reproduced below to the citizens of Highland Park.

Food and clothing to face the cold! Generous as previous responses have been, there are still families right here in Highland Park without fuel or food and with only half enough clothing or bedding to face the severe cold that is here. Worst of all, these conditions exist in homes where men and women are crying for an opportunity to work. These are the cases that the Social Service Committee are working night and day to care for.

Citizens are asked to notify the committee by calling Highland Park 4000 at once if they have any cast-off clothing to spare. It will be promptly picked up by the Iredale Storage trucks. Clothing is sorted, cleaned and mended and then used where it is needed the most.

At the moment, women's and children's clothing are the most urgently needed. Beginning Tuesday, a high school drive was conducted to gather such clothing. More is needed.

Everyone who can is urged to help by making a job, no matter how small it may be, for some unfortunate. It is vital that some member of each of these families gets a chance to work. All the food and clothing that the committee can gather is only a temporary measure. Work is the only final remedy.

There are hundreds of families in Highland Park who can afford to buy a day's work at 50 cents an hour.

Under the slogan: *Adopt a Family for a Day, a Week, or a Month*—the Social Service Committee has made the following appeal:

"Can't you, dear citizen, be a god-father to one of these families for a period — even though it is only for a week? It would be the act of a good Samaritan. It would make you feel happier this Christmas. And just think of what it would mean to the unfortunate little children and their sad parents!"
