Edward Golden, motorman for a number of years on the North Shore line, died Friday, Nov. 21, in the Victory Memorial hospital, in Waukegan, following an operation for ulcers of the stomach, performed two weeks ago. He was 42 years of age and is survived by his widow and two children.

The funeral service was held Monday at St. James church, Highwood, and burial was in the Everett cemetery. The family home is at 50 Michigan avenue, Highwood.

Miss Marguerite Axt Dies; Funeral Is Held Wednesday Afternoon

Miss Marguerite Axt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Axt, 111 High street, Highwood, died Monday in the Augustana hospital, Chicago. She was aged 17 years, four months and nine days. She was born Sept. 15, 1913.

In May, 1929, Miss Axt was injured in an automobile accident on Prairie avenue. She suffered a bad skull fracture and several operations followed. Her brain was seriously injured and later her spine was affected and paralysis finally resulted. Every possible care that surgical skill and nursing could provide was given the unfortunate girl during her long illness.

She is survived by her parents and four sisters and two brothers, Rosebud, Violet, Pansy, Blossom, Albert, Jr. and Phillip Axt.

The funeral is to be held Wednesday afternoon. A brief service will be held at the home at 2 o'clock, and at 2:30 the church service will be at the Highwood M. E. church, corner of Highwood avenue and Everts place. Burial will be in the North Shore cemetery.

The many friends of the family in Highwood and Highland Park extend sincere sympathy.

The following is contributed: Marguerite Axt, the 17 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Axt of High street Highwood died at the Augustana hospital, Monday morning, after an illness of more than 18 months.

On the evening of May 20, 1929, Marguerite was seriously injured when the automobile which she was riding was struck from the rear by another car. Her worst injury was a fracture of the skull from which she never recovered. Although her condition seemed to improve at times, a brain infection, spreading to her spine and causing paralysis of the lower limbs, finally claimed her life.

Her valiant fight for life, in spite of tremendous odds, won her the admiration of all. (She was in the hospital four times for a total of 35 weeks. She underwent 10 operations and had five blood transfusions.) Members of her own family and other friends joined forces in an effort to help, but nothing would avail.

Her death, coming as a shadow to many who were hoping that she might regain her strength, was no tragedy for Marguerite. Her desire to live well made it also possible for her to die well. Thus it was that she was able to approach her grave "sustained and soothed by an unflinching trust, like one who wraps the drapery of his couch about him and lies down to pleasant dreams."

May the God of all consolation comfort the hearts of the bereaved and help them to see that what seems to be their loss is Marguerite's gain.
