The compilation of statistics for the past two years covering the quantities of flowers, fruits, vegetables, jellies, and similar delicacies donated to the Guild for the uses of the poor and the sick in the Chicago district, show that Highland Park stands first. The donations are made by any interested citizens of our town, through the committee for that purpose of the Highland Park Garden Study club, of which Mrs. Lee Gatewood is chairman.

On each Friday morning during the summer and early autumn members of this committee are stationed at the depot to receive donations of flowers or vegetables from home gardens, later packing them and sending them to the city for distribution.

Mrs. Gatewood's work has been so outstanding that she has been appointed vice-chairman for this district, comprising the territory from Glencoe to Ft. Sheridan, inclusive.

That play is the first they will give at their regular matinee for young people. The Evanston Children's theatre will fill the February and March dates with plays from their season's repertoire. One will be A. A. Milne's "Make Believe," the other will be announced later.

The parents who are in doubt as to the merit of these afternoons are urged to talk to those mothers and fathers who went with their children to last year's performances.
