**Hearing Resumed on Track Elevation in North Shore Cities**

Hearings before the Illinois Commerce Commission on the grade separation controversy were resumed next Tuesday, November 25 in Springfield, Ill. At that time, representatives of North Shore villages continued presentation of testimony.

During the past week, the Commission has been hearing pleas from representatives of villages from Wilmette to Highland Park, urging grade separation. Walter A. Shaw, consulting engineer, has detailed testimony as to why separation is urgently needed in Kenilworth, Winnetka, Glencoe and Highland Park. Village Manager Henry Woolhizer, presented the pleas of Winnetka, and Village Manager F. L. Streed of Kenilworth cited specific cases of loss of life and property resulting from

grade crossing accidents.

Present at the hearings were attorneys for the North Western Line and the North Shore, who took notes, from which they anticipate showing that the railroads are not in a position at this time to make the huge expenditure incident to grade separation in North Shore towns.

Immediate action in the matter is urged by the village representatives and managers. Francis X. Busch, chief counsel for the villages, who is active in the grade fight, is being represented by Attorney C. M. Doty.

**Waukegan Drug Store Held Up by Bandits**

Holding up the Hutchinson Drug store at 1009 North avenue, Waukegan, with guns, three robbers forced clerks in the store to give up \$100 in cash at 8 o'clock last week.

This is the latest of a series of Waukegan store robberies this fall, which were partly cleared up yesterday when the burglars who stuck up the Denman store on Belvidere were identified.

L. J. Bowers, night clerk in the store, reports that three young men from 20 to 22 years of age, entered the store about 8 o'clock. The leader of the trio shouted, "Stick 'em up,

this is a holdup." Charles Mears, 929 Ash street, who was waiting in the store with Bowers, retreated into the washroom in the rear. The robbers took \$3 cash from Mears and then forced Bowers into the washroom with him.

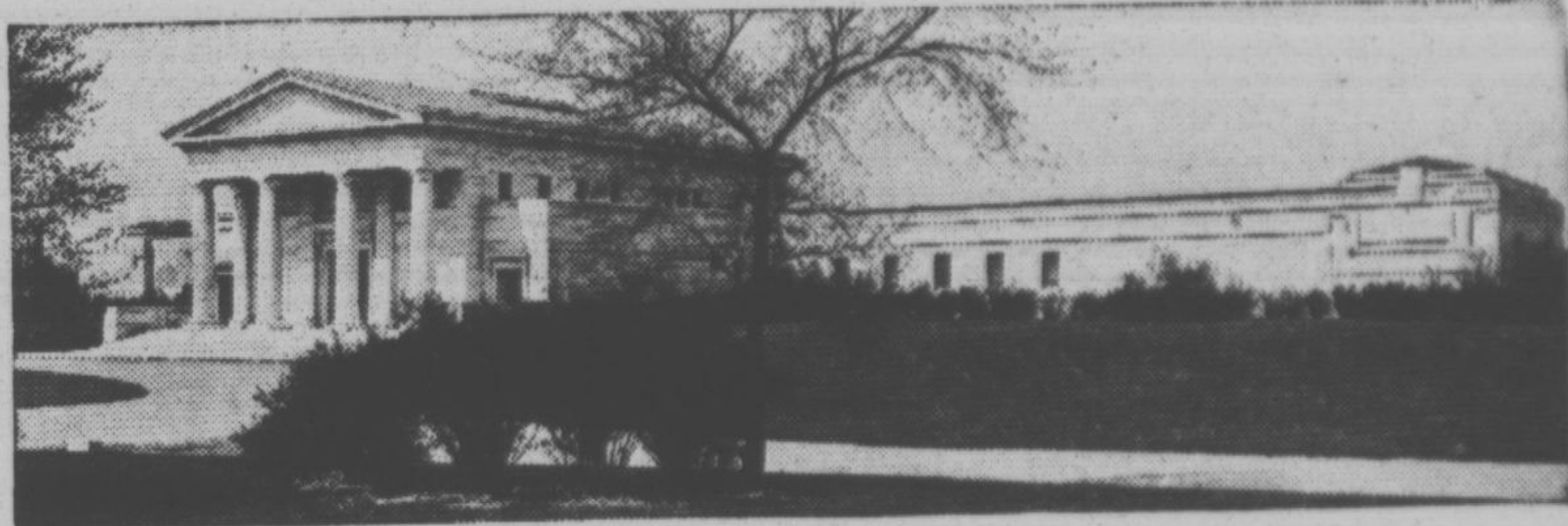
Opening the cash register, they removed approximately \$100 and fled through the front door.

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
