Bills Secreted and Old Size May Never Be Presented at Banks, Belief

Millions in old size currency which was replaced more than a year ago The Lake county circuit court fixed by the new small size paper money will never be presented for redemption, treasury officials have estimated, says a U. P. story from Washington.

> Various methods of determining the amount which will never come back place the aggregate gain to the government at from \$10,000,000 to as much as \$70,000,000. In addition to amounts destroyed and lost, the treasury believes at least \$60,-000,000 has been hoarded.

> Although new small sized currency began circulating 15 months ago, a total of \$890,209,000 in old size money is still outstanding. If only one per cent of this fails to return, the treasury will save \$8,902,090.

> Joseph S. McCoy, treasury actuary, believes that hoarding of paper money equals at least 50 cent per capita for the 122,000,000 persons in the United States, or a total of \$61,-000,000.

> Aggregate hoardings of paper money, silver currency and gold is placed by McCoy at more than \$400,-000,000. This money is hoarded by the estimated 8,000 misers in this country, in children's banks, by foreigners who do not trust our banks, by those in isolated communities without banks, and by many who wish to keep a certain mount of currency always on hand.

> Catastrophies such as the Chicago or San Francisco fires destroy large amounts of currency. Thousands are lost annually in smaller fires or explosions.

> The fastest turnover in currency is in the \$1 bills. The average life of one of the old \$1 bills was eight months, so it is probable most of those of the old series still out have either been destroyed or are hoarded. There are \$340,908 of unredeemed \$1 bills in national bank notes alone.

Conservation Project **Voted Down in State** at November Election

The conservation bond issue was voted down at the recent election, it was indicated in unofficial returns available last week at Springfield.

Downstate, according to the unofficial tabulation disapproved the measure by a majority of 146,248. Cook county when it files its official vote, is expected to show a majority of approximately 100,000 in favor of the proposal.

In addition to an indicated adverse vote on the proposition itself, the measure required a majority of all votes cast for members of the general assembly. Unofficial returns show that 1,069,208 legislative votes were cast downstate.

The proposal was favored in 23 counties, including Cook, the unofficial compilation indicates. Cook county's official vote is not expected to be filed with the secretary of state for another week or ten days.


