Junior Workshop Gives Two Original One-Acts

The Ravinia Junior Drama Workshop held their first open meeting off Tuesday evening, in the Ravinia Village house. Walking rehearsals were given of two original plays, and after each performance, Mrs. James Cady Ewell led a general discussion in which both actors and audience participated. Much praise was bestowed upon the talented young authors. Weak spots were also pointed out and freely criticized, which seemed to please playwrights even more than the praise.

The first play, entitled "The Stranger," by Gertrude Williams, succeeded very well in projecting the atmosphere of a national park camp, at which young college students called "savages," make a jolly game of their work, and also find poetry and beauty in their surroundings.

The second play, by Guernsey LePelley, entitled "A Favor for a Lady" is a fast moving comedy, written with a trustworthy instinct for the theatre. It displayed a smoothness not usually found in a first play. Both playwrights have a fine facility for "sure fire" dialogue, and the audience was highly entertained from first to last.

This group has affiliated itself with the Ravinia Drama Workshop, which was organized five years ago. The two groups will function independently of one another, except for an occasional open meeting together. The junior group demand nothing more from the senior group than an audience, at such times as they give performances or walking rehearsals. They have plans under way to give a finished public performance sometime after the holidays.

119,000 Registered Last Year in Various Sports; Etc.; Four Rinks Operated

The four skating rinks operated by the East Park board and located as follows: Sunset Wood, Lincoln Park at Lincoln and Glencoe avenues, West Ravinia station park on Burton avenue, and Port Clinton Park on Bloom street near Maria street, are now in full operation.

Two new rinks have been added this year—the one on Burton avenue and the one on Bloom street.

At Burton avenue the shelter is in the basement of a dwelling and is provided with all conveniences.

At Bloom street a small shelter house has been built provided with stove heat and benches.

At Lincoln avenue some improvements have been made about the shelter that will be of material benefit to those using the rink. The rink has been enlarged and better lighting provided.

All of the rinks are provided with flood lights.

Many Registrations

Last year there were 17,000 registrations at the two rinks then in use.

D. A. R. Better Films Committee Review

One of the finest pictures of the year from the standpoint of suitability for the entire family, and being quite ideal as a Junior Matinee production comes to the local theatre next Saturday. Parents need have no hesitancy in allowing their young people to see the,

"Silent Enemy" a beautifully executed production showing the desperate quest of the Ojibway Indians for food. Two scenes are usually beautiful, that of the snow at sunset, and one where the chief sits motionless in the falling snow as he confers with the Great Spirit on the mountain. A convincing epic of genuine Indian life.

"Let's Go Native" a Paramount picture with Jack Oakie. A hilarious farce-comedy very entertaining and amusing with ridiculous and funny situations. Family treat.

"A Lady Surrenders" this drama of triangle theme, from the novel by John Erskine, is a very entertaining picture. The acting of Genevieve Tobin, Rose Hobart and Conrad Nagel is notable. Although dealing with a married woman's European love affair, the picture is so well handled by John Stahl, director, that it becomes excellent entertainment for adults. Not recommended for children or youths.

"Moby Dick" a talking version of Melville's classic full of realism and gruesome thrills. John Barrymore's work is excellent of course but it is a very strong picture and perhaps too exciting for all but the more mature audiences.

As usual another interesting episode of the regular Saturday serial "The Indians Are Coming" will unroll itself at the matinee performance.
