The four skating rinks operated by the East Park board and located as follows: Sunset Wood, Lincoln Park at Lincoln and Glencoe avenues, West enue, and Port Clinton Park on Bloom street near Maria street, are now in full operation.

Two new rinks have been added this year—the one on Burton avenue and the one on Bloom street.

At Burton avenue the shelter is in the basement of a dwelling and is provided with all conveniences.

At Bloom street a small shelter house has been built provided with stove heat and benches.

At Lincoln avenue some improvements have been made about the shelter that will be of material benefit to those using the rink. The rink has been enlarged and better lighting provided.

All of the rinks are provided with flood lights.
