## SHERIFF TIFFANY NAMES HIS AIDES

**Assumes Duties Monday; Appointments Made; Two are from Lake Forest**

Appointment of Assistant Chief of Police Thomas E. Kennedy of Waukegan as chief deputy sheriff was made by Sheriff Lester Tiffany, who took office Monday. Complete list of the new sheriff's appointments follow:

Chief Kennedy, Waukegan, a policeman since 1920, elevated to a captaincy in 1923 and to assistant chief in 1927.

John Froelich, of Lake Zurich, who is to be in charge of legal service, and now a police sergeant in Lake Forest. Froelich served as a deputy sheriff under Edwin Ahlstrom.

Russell McBride, of Mundelein to be in charge of serving paper. McBride is a Lake Forest policeman.

### Woman Deputy

Mrs. Margaret Holland Pillifant, of Waukegan, wife of Dewey Pillifant, is established as the first regular deputy sheriff. She will handle not only juvenile and women prisoners but regular routine work of the office.

Mrs. Eleanor Jolley Emmons, daughter of Mrs. L. B. Jolley and the late Dr. L. B. Jolley, of Waukegan, will be secretary to the sheriff and bookkeeper.

Andrew Unger, of Waukegan, is to be a motorcycle policeman. He was one of the first motorcycle policemen in Waukegan.

Elmer Hudson, of Waukegan, will be night turnkey. He served under Elmer Green, Edwin Ahlstrom and Lawrence Doolittle.

### Fred Brown Back

Fred Brown, of Waukegan, is to be returned as a deputy. He was chief deputy sheriff under Lawrence Doolittle for three and a half years and prior to that was in the clothing business. He will be bailiff in charge in the circuit court.

Harvey Hyde, North Chicago, owner of a confectionery store, is to be day

turnkey to succeed Thomas Tyrrell. Hyde served as a policeman in North Chicago for years.

Ira Smith, Fremont township farmer, is to be bailiff in the circuit court.

Elvio Palmieri, of Highwood, is to be bailiff in the circuit court. He was a former Highwood policeman.

Al Edgerton, Zion filling station owner, will become bailiff in the county court and will be in charge.

Justice Sidney Burridge, of Lake Forest, will be bailiff in the probate court.

### Thayer Heads Janitors

Charles Thayer, of Waukegan, is to become head janitor. He served as janitor in the county building for 26 years until released by Ahlstrom.

Under Thayer will be Adam Vogel, of Waukegan, a former constable, Robert Nickels, now head janitor, and Ferdinand Mikesch. Mikesch and Nickles have been employed as janitors since 1923.

Wilbur Hende, of Waukegan, is to remain as the elevator operator, and Jennie Leban, who was a cook under the Ahlstrom administration, will cook for the prisoners during the Tiffany regime.

Tiffany will go before the board of supervisors Dec. 9 and suggest two squad cars to operate on county highways. He will need them, he contends, because the regular force of deputies will be occupied with routine work.

The sheriff elect is not prepared fully to discuss plans for the motorcycle crew. Undoubtedly there will be more appointments in the future, possibly in the spring, to cover this necessary force.

"I made an effort to get men of experience. If you will notice most of them have served on police departments or have had court experience so that they will make competent bailiffs," Tiffany said.

Tiffany served as chief deputy from 1923 to 1926 and then became chief of police in Lake Forest.
