## Great Lakes and Fort Heads Exchange Calls

Brigadier General Manus McCloskey, U. S. Army, recently assigned as commanding officer at Fort Sheridan, Illinois, accompanied by Major Sumner Waite, U. S. Army, made an official call on Rear Admiral Walter S. Crosley, U. S. Navy, commandant of the Ninth Naval District and Great Lakes Naval Training station, on Nov. 22. On his arrival at Great Lakes he was given full honors by the guard company and band, and on his departure a salute of 11 guns was rendered.

Rear Admiral Crosley, accompanied by Lieut. Francis H. Gilmer, U. S. Navy, his aide, returned the call of Brigadier General McCloskey on Nov. 25. Upon arriving at the edge of the Army reservation at Fort Sheridan Rear Admiral Crosley received a salute from a company of cavalry, which escorted him to General Headquarters, where a company of field artillery and a company of infantry rendered the necessary honors, and a salute of 13 guns was fired.

## Lake Co. Standing in Raw Material Purchase

Lake county ranks 127 in the purchase of raw materials by manufacturers, according to a report issued by the census bureau for 1930, says a special dispatch from Washington to the Waukegan Times.

The entire list, surprisingly enough is not let by New York county but by Cook county, Ill., with \$2,048,071,339 worth of purchased (materials, supplies, fuel and power).

New York is second with \$1,886,978,816, while Wayne county, Mich., is third with \$1,246,711,481.

Lake county's purchases were given as \$38,361,101.

Manufacturers in a territory about 60 miles square consume virtually one-third of the raw materials used by all the manufacturers in the county, according to Edward R. Dewey, chief of the industrial section of the census bureau.

## PROPERTY VALUATION IN LAKE CO. ESTIMATE

### Board of Review Announces Its Figures for This Year; Details Given

The total valuation of all property in Lake county is set by the board of review at \$106,503,430 or \$52,855 less than the assessors returned as a valuation in the spring.

The figure, however, is \$1,385,035 greater than it was a year ago.

The board of review, of which Supervisor Harry Stratton, of Lake Villa, was chairman, and John O'Keefe, Highland Park, and Mrs. Nellie Crooks, Waukegan, were members, was in session from June 24 until Wednesday, Nov. 26, and drew \$5,162 in salaries which included \$176 for incidentals. This was \$19.20 less than was expended a year ago but there was one more week of work this year.

Personal property this year was shown to have a value of \$14,645,895 or \$114,625 more than was found by the assessors. ### Show 1929 Figures

In 1929 the personal property had amounted to \$15,313,550 or \$66,525 higher than the assessor's figures and the real estate reached \$89,804,845 which was \$38,345 under the valuation set by the assessors for a grand total of \$105,118,395.

## Natural Gas Pipe Line May Traverse N. Shore

Construction of a 1000-mile pipe line from the Texas Panhandle to Chicago, which soon will be pumping natural gas into Chicago for distribution throughout the Great Lakes region, is giving employment to 10,000 men in the midwest, according to Henry L. Doherty & Company.

The project, which engineers have compared to a transcontinental railroad, will cost \$100,000,000. It is being financed by a group of large oil companies united in the Continental Construction company.

The pipe line will supply natural gas to 50 cities from Texas to Chicago though a 24 inch pipe and 100,000 tons of additional piping of smaller dimension.

Engineers are considering the feasibility of extending the line from Chicago to Detroit and Milwaukee, and mixing natural and manufactured gas to strengthen the man-made product.

Such an extension would traverse the suburban north shore, it is believed.
