at the opening of the rink. Previous years a rink was operated by the local citizens at the Ravinia school.

The four rinks now provided by the Park board are well distributed throughout the district and will provide winter sport and recreation to a large number of the citizens of the district.

Identification Cards

Identification cards are issued to the citizens of the district without charge and may be obtained at the Park Board office in the City hall or at the shelter houses. The holders of these cards may bring guests to the rink by paying 10c during the day up to 6 p.m. and 25c after 6 p.m. This arrangement prevents the influx of non-residents to the exclusion of the residents.

The Park Board recreational activities have grown rapidly during the Tast four years and its records show during the past year the following results:

Registration for Golf ...... 38,000 Registration for skating ...... 17,000 Registration for beaches ...... 30,000 Registration for dancing ...... 16,800 Registration for playgrounds 17,800

Total registration of all activities for which records are kept, 119,600.

Other Activities In addition to the activities mentioned there were 45 games of indoor ball, 13 cricket matches and severa! games of soccer while smaller groups played horse shoe, archery etc., all of which would add considerably to the figure stated.

It is surprising how little is known of the extent of the Park Board's recreational activities. This work is worthy of the support and encouragement of the citizens of the district.

### NEW PARKING SERVICE IS OFFERED FIELD'S PATRONS

New parking service for its patrons was announced this week by the Evanston store of Marshall Field & Co. This service provides housing of automobiles in a modern heated garage and is expected to prove especially valuable in cold weather such as that of recent days. A nominal fee is charged.
