

EXPLAINS SANITARY BOND ISSUE PROJECT

John Oliver, Pres. N. S. Sanitary Dist., Tells Reason for Election Dec. 20

In the following communication President John Oliver of the North Shore Sanitary district explains the purpose of the \$1,200,000 bond issue which the voters of the district are asked to approve at a special election Dec. 20. The letter:

For the benefit of those who are not familiar with the North Shore Sanitary district, and its operation, the organization, scope and purposes of the district will be briefly outlined as follows:

The board of trustees of the district are appointed by the judges of the Circuit Court of Lake county and are selected from the various sections of the district, the present members being John Oliver of Highland Park, James Anderson, Jr. of Lake Forest, Walter Atkinson of North Chicago, David Webb of Waukegan and Julius Bidinger also of Waukegan. The district was organized in 1914 in order to reduce the pollution of the Lake caused by the dumping into it of practically untreated sewage from all of the eight cities between the County Line of Cook and Lake and the State Line of Illinois (Continued on page 56)

Henry Cowell, Outstanding Figure in Music World to Speak on Modern Music

Ultra-modern music, long buffeted about by critical opinion, has emerged with a firm grip upon public interest. It has won recognition as a worthy development in the art of music.

The outstanding American figure in the modern music world is Henry Cowell, pianist and composer. Europe has lent him a respectful ear, and his own country has paid him the tribute of active encouragement. It was not an easy victory, for Mr. Cowell has had to pay the penalty of the trail-breaker—the trilogy of contumely—amazement—and finally admiration.
