### Women Voters League **Board Meets Dec. 17:** Election Law Revision

There will be an important board meeting of the Highland Park League of Women Voters next Wednesday morning. Dec. 17, at 9:30, at the home of Mrs. Constant Hopkins. All board members are urged to be present.

As an opening gun in the campaign which the Illinois League of Women Voters will urge for the revision of election laws, comes a sixteen page pamphlet entitled "Improving the Illinois Election System." This pamphlet includes a summary of model election laws, as compiled by the National Municipal League, a discussion of permanent registration, the short ballot and the Massachusetts ballot. These last three items are the reforms which the league seeks as immediate relief to the over burdened Illinois voter. A sample of the 1930 Sangamon county ballot is reproduced as arranged in the compact office group or Massachusetts style, and is the most telling demonstration of the advantages of this ballot.
