Wants Auto Speed Cut To 12 Miles in Cemetery

It is of interest to a very large percentage of the citizens of the North Shore that John Western, founder and manager of North Shore cemetery, is conducting a campaign to get visitors to that most beautiful garden place of interment to hold down the speed of their automobiles to twelve miles per hour. Mr. Western says there are three leading reasons why this result should be accomplished, viz:

(a) "It is a cemetery, and our good gray poet, the beloved Longfellow, has coined the beautiful and reverential phrase, 'God's Acre,' as descriptive of such place."

Mr. Western quotes from a speech delivered by Ernest S. Leland, a leading dealer in memorial work in New York City, when referring to the sacredness of a fine cemetery and the lack of refinement shown in desecrating it in any way; "Surely, the public would rise up against such desecration of God's house—then why not against the desecration of God's acre?"

(b) "Our fine white driveways soon would be destroyed if we permitted motorists to follow their natural bent and drive as they do on the public highways. While we have most excellent driveways, they would not stand such year very long, and we do not want to cover them with black asphalt. To me there is nothing attractive about an asphalt road, while everybody with refined taste admires our white drives in contrast with the green colored foliage and flowers which we have here during a considerable portion of the year."

(c) "There is much to be seen here for anybody interested in art or nature and these benefits cannot be derived by people who go shooting about the grounds at an unseemly rate of speed."

As a parting remark Mr. Western stated his judgment to be that not over 1 per cent are inclined to be indifferent concerning this important matter and that it is the 1 per cent for which he is concerned, although he says he has seen practically entire funeral corteges shoot out the main driveway "like mad" after the last words had been said at the grave.
