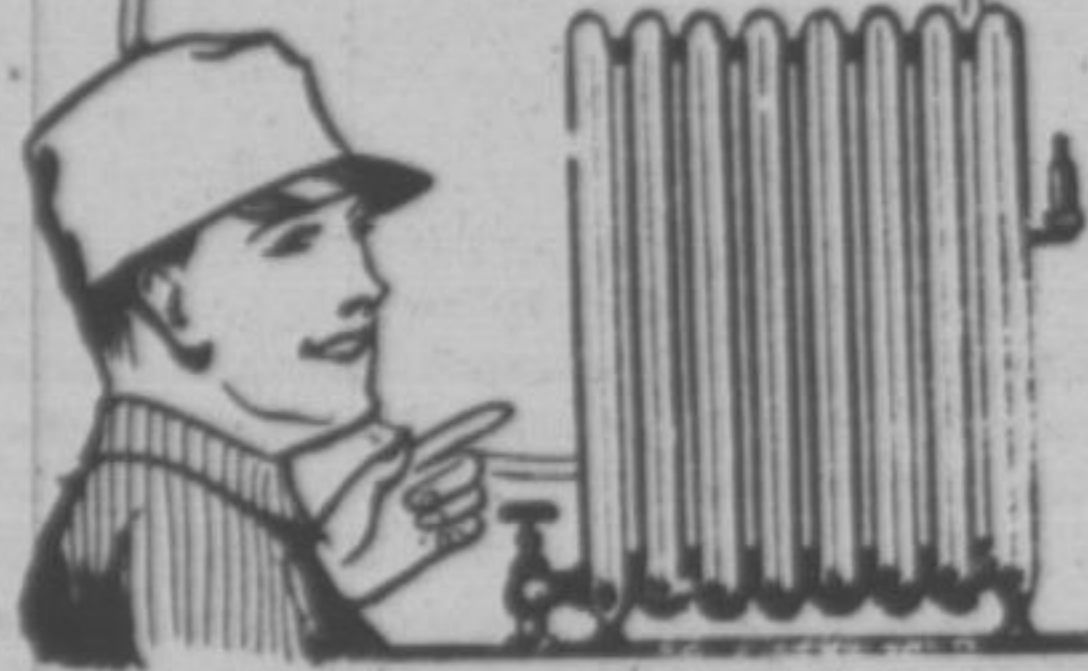

Words Often Misused

Do not say, "From thence we returned to St. Louis." Omit "from." "Thence" means "from that place."

Do not say, "I shall not accept of his offer." Omit "of."

Do not say, "Her jewelry is beautiful." Say, "Her jewels are beautiful."

Do not say, "Why take farther notice of it?" Use "further" to express quantity or degree.

Do not say, "The man was hung." Say, "was hanged." However, "the picture was hung" is correct.

Do not say, "The climate is healthy." Say, "The climate is healthful."

Words Often Mispronounced

Neuter. Pronounce nu-ter, u as in "unit," not noo-ter.

Contiguous. Pronounce kon-tig-u-us, o as in "on," i as in "it," g as in "go," first u as in "unit," last u as in "us," and accent second syllable.

Lohengrin. Pronounce lo-en-grin, o as in "low," e as in "men," i as in "in," accent first syllable.

Second-hand. Accent first syllable and do not say "second-handed."

Forgive. Pronounce the o as in "of," not as in "or."

Cranberry; cran, not cram.

Words Often Misspelled

Chiffonier; observe the ff and the ier. Fair (just); fare (food, also the price of transportation.) Remit (one t), remittance, remitted, remitter, remitting (two t's.) Meant; not ment. Coliseum; one l, and observe the i. Fairwell; fare, not fair.

Enervate, enfeeble, delilitate, weaken.

Devise, contrive, invent, discover, plan.

Devout, pious, religious.

Complex, complicated, intricate, implicated, entangled, perplexed, twisted.

Fatal, deadly, mortal, pernicious, destructive.

August, majestic, magnificent, grand, noble, stately, imposing.

Word Study
