Following are brief descriptions of these features:

"Moby Dick"

The story of "Moby Dick" last showing at Deerpath, Dec. 12, is adapted from Herman Melville's immortal classic of whaling days, "Moby Dick," which recounts the legendary doings of the great white whale of the same name, destroyer of men and ships.
