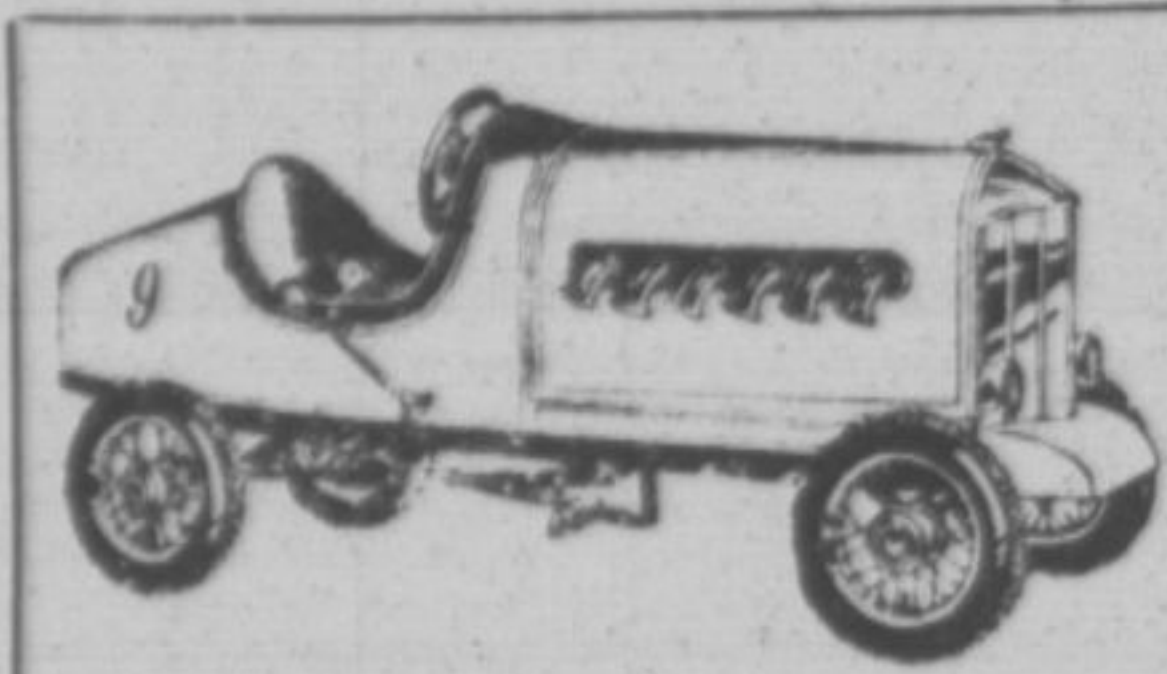
Leave Here Dec. 29

Reduced Holiday Rates on North Shore Line

Persons planning on trips during the Christmas and New Year holidays to any points in north shore territory or throughout the middle west are offered special reduced rates by the North Shore Line, it was announced today by R. S. Amis, general passenger agent. The special holiday rate will be a fare and one-third for the round trip between all points on the North Shore Line, as well as to points throughout the middle west served by interconnecting roads.

Dates of ticket sales under this arrangement will be December 19-24 inclusive, with final return to original starting point prior to midnight January 6, said Mr. Amis. Minimum excursion rates for adults will be one dollar, with half fare for children. Usual baggage checking arrangements will be provided under this holiday rate.

EXPLAINS SANITARY BOND ISSUE PROJECT

and Wisconsin, a distance of 25 miles of shore line.

Early Conditions

When sewer systems were originally installed in the towns adjoining the lake, the known methods of sewage disposal were very primitive. The easiest and least expensive method of disposing of the sewage from these towns was to deposit it in the lake. Therefore, the sewers were constructed by the various municipalities to accomplish that result years before the organization of the North Shore Sanitary district. As the population along the north shore increased it became evident that something had to be done to remedy the existing conditions and to provide for the future.

At the time the North Shore Sanitary district was formed, as a result of the favorable vote of the people in the district, it was necessary to study the conditions and determine the best methods for improving them. Considering the existing sewer systems, it was decided that the most practical and economical solution of the problem would be to construct sewage treatment plants near the lake shore.

Only Funds Available

The only funds available for this purpose were those coming to the district from general taxes. From time to time as the funds accumulated, they have been used to construct new plants, eight of which have been built and are in operation. It is obvious that as new plants were built the funds available for new construction must necessarily be reduced because of the increasing operating cost due to additional construction. This condition has now developed to a point where funds from general taxes would accumulate for new construction so slowly that the improvement of sanitary conditions in the district is practically impossible unless more money were available. It therefore is evident that a bond issue is required to provide funds for additional sewage treatment plants to complete the program of the district.

The largest sources of pollution in the district are at Cary avenue, Highland Park and at Waukegan where it is proposed to build the largest of the new plants. Because of the pollution of the water supply at the intakes and bathing beaches of both cities, it is highly important to these cities to provide as soon as possible for the treatment of the sewage.

Population of 75,000

It is estimated that the district contains, at the present time, a population of 75,000. The sewage from approximately 34,000 people is discharged into the lake untreated, producing, every 24 hours 7,000,000 gallons of untreated sewage which carries into the lake three tons of suspended solids with millions of bacteria of intestinal origin. A large part of this sewage is carried past your water intakes and bathing beaches.

It has been proposed to issue bonds of the North Shore Sanitary District, Lake county, Illinois, to the amount

of \$1,200,000 for the purpose of constructing additional sewage treatment plants. Construction of public improvements of this type can be carried on today at costs of lower than they have been for some time and probably lower than they will be for some time to come, and at the same time provide needed employment and business activity. If the voters approve this program, it is intended to require, as far as is legally possible, that the contractors employ local labor and purchase material from local dealers in the various cities in the district.

Twenty-Year Period

It is also planned to extend the repayment of the bonds over a 20 year period and to retire no bonds during the first four years. The increase of taxes necessary for the bond issue will be very slight. It is estimated that for the first four years the increase would be only 64c each year for each \$50 paid in taxes at present. In the fifth year, the increase would be \$1.36. Each year thereafter, the amount would decrease, owing to the retirement of bonds.

The total cost including the eight plants already built and in operation together with the building of the new plants will amount to approximately \$22 for each person residing in the district which is a very much lower cost to the tax payer than the cost of such construction in other parts of the country.

To vote YES on Dec. 20 on this bond issue means the cleaning up of a bad condition.

To vote NO on Dec. 20, at best, means the continuation of the conditions as they are today, a menace to the health of yourself and your children.

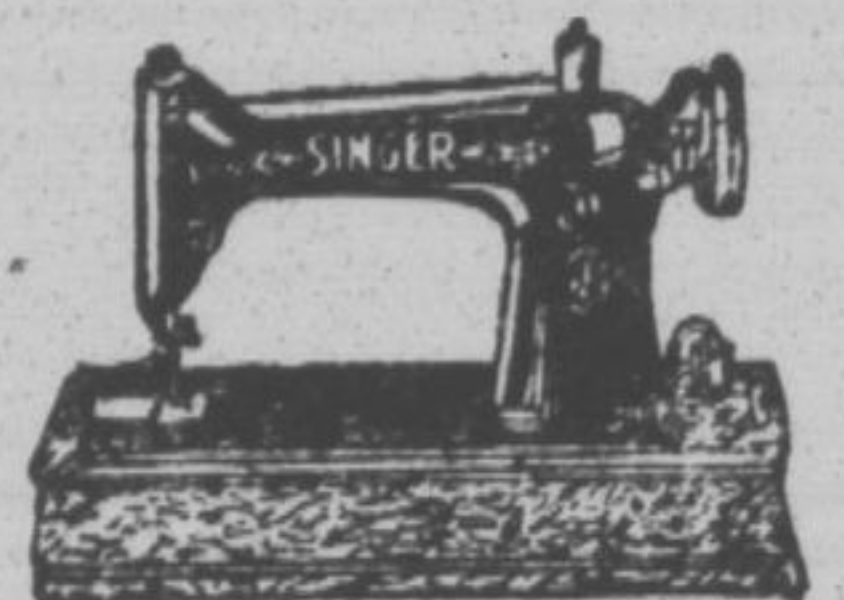
